HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
Substantive of the bill of the 17th January 17.
Mr. L. H. Moore introduced a bill entitled "An act supplementary to the several acts relative to concurrent elections." Read for the 1st time, 2d reading on to-morrow.
Mr. Allard presented to the house a petition from the register of conveyances. Referred to a special committee.
Mr. Mouton presented to the house four petitions from the inhabitants of St. Landry, praying that new elections precinct may be created. Referred to the table.

A message from the Senate, requesting the concurrence of this House in the following bills: An act to receive the provisions of an act entitled "An act to explain certain doubts on the competency admission of certain witnesses," and "An act for the relief of Jean Pierre Bergeron, of the interior parish of St. Louis, La Fourche." Read for the 1st time, 2d reading to-morrow.
By the same message the House was informed that the Senate had adopted with amendments the bill from this House supplementary to the act relative to weighers of cotton in the city of N. Orleans, and the concurrence of the House was requested in said amendment.
Mr. Hébert, in behalf of the committee to whom was referred the petition of several inhabitants of the parish of Iberville, praying for an amendment to a law authorizing them to raise money by means of a lottery, reported by introducing the following bill: An act to amend the act authorizing certain inhabitants of the parish of Iberville, to raise by means of a lottery the sum of money therein mentioned. First and 2d reading, third reading to-morrow.

The House took up the amendments made by the Senate, to the bill supplementary to the act appointing weighers of cotton.
On motion, the amendments in the 1st section, ordering the petition to be verified on the 1st Monday of each month, was rejected, and the other amendments were adopted. The Senate was informed thereof.
Agreeably to previous notice, Mr. Bernard introduced a bill entitled "An act providing for the appointment of an inspector of flour and pork in the town of St. Francisville, and for other purposes, read for the first time, second reading to-morrow.

A message from the Senate informing this House that the Senate had decided from their amendment to the 1st section of the bill supplementary to the act appointing weighers of cotton.
Agreeably to previous notice, Mr. Woodruff introduced a bill entitled "An act for the benefit of the college of Louisiana;" read for the 1st time, 2d reading on Monday 21st inst.
Mr. Winfree, in behalf of the committee to whom had been referred the petition of A. G. Penn, reported by introducing the following bill: An act for the relief of A. G. Penn." read for the first time, second reading to-morrow.

Mr. McGuire introduced the following resolution: "Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives, that a joint committee composed of three members of this House, and—of the Senate be appointed for the purpose of visiting the male orphan asylum, and report on the condition of said institution. On motion, ordered, that the same do lie on the table until to-morrow morning.
Agreeably to previous notice, Mr. John Moore introduced a bill entitled "An act supplementary to an act entitled "An act fixing the fees of sheriffs for conveying persons convicted, and for other purposes, read for the first time, second reading to-morrow.

ORDER OF THE DAY.
The bill entitled "An act to incorporate the trustees of the Covington academy, and for other purposes," read for the 2nd time 3rd reading to-morrow.
The bill entitled "An act to indemnify Charles André Cerisay, sheriff of the parish of St. James," read for the third time, and taken into consideration. On motion, the House formed itself into a committee of the whole for the consideration of said bill. Mr. Morphy was called to the chair, and after some time, on motion, the committee of the whole rose, the speaker having resumed his seat, the chairman of the committee reported that they had had said bill under consideration, and had adopted the same. The House took up said bill.
On motion, ordered, that the same do pass and be entitled "An act to indemnify Charles André Cerisay, sheriff of the parish of St. James." The concurrence of the Senate was requested therein.
The bill from the Senate entitled "An act relative to the manumission of the slave George and for other purposes." An act relative to the sheriff of the parishes of St. Charles and St. Jean Baptiste."—An act to authorize widows and unmarried women of age to become surties or endorsers, and for

other purposes."—An act to amend the third section of an act to accord certain privileges to the town of Natchitoches, approved 30th February, 1819." Read for the second time, third reading to-morrow.
The bill entitled "An act to incorporate the Presbyterian congregation at St. Francisville," read for the 3rd time, and taken up section by section.—On motion, ordered, that the same do pass without amendment, and be entitled "An act to incorporate the Presbyterian congregation at St. Francisville."
The clerk was directed to inform the Senate thereof.—A message from the Senate by their secretary, requesting the concurrence of the House in a resolution directing the committee appointed on Mr. Louis Moreau Lislet's petition to examine also the petition of Martin's digest by Mr. Achille Chapotin.

On motion, ordered, that the same be adopted. The Senate was informed thereof. By the same message the concurrence of the House was requested in the following resolution.
Resolved that a joint committee of two members from the Senate and—members from the House, be appointed for the purpose of devising the means of negotiating in foreign states, a loan in the name of the state with an interest which shall not exceed five per cent per annum in order to pay the debts of the state in the banks, and to provide for internal improvements. And that Messrs. Moreau Lislet, and Smith, of Feliciana had been appointed on the part of the Senate.
On motion, the blank was filled with the word five. Whereupon the speaker appointed Messrs. Allard, J. Moore, Maurian, Landry, and Saunders, members of said committee. The Senate was informed thereof.

The House resumed the discussion of the bill from the Senate, entitled "An act to amend the act entitled "An act to establish a navigation company for the improvement of the navigation of the Bayou Plaquemine and Bayou Pigeon." Said bill having undergone some amendments, on motion, ordered that the same do pass and retain its former title.
The clerk was directed to inform the Senate thereof, and request their concurrence in the amendments made by this house.
The bill entitled "An act to authorize the state treasurer to pay to the persons therein named, a certain sum of money," was read for the 3d time.

On motion, the House formed itself into a committee of the whole for the consideration of said bill. Mr. Landry was called to the chair, and after some time, on motion, the committee of the whole rose, Mr. speaker having resumed his seat, the chairman of the committee reported that they had had said bill under their consideration, and had adopted the same.
The house then took up said bill. On motion, ordered, that the same do pass and be entitled "An act to authorize the state treasurer to pay to the persons therein named, a certain sum of money." The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate therein. On motion, the house adjourned till to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

From the N. Y. Journal of Commerce, December 25.
Regular mails are made up at our Post Office for Havre, and forwarded on the 1st and 15th of each month, and for Vera Cruz (Mexico) and forwarded on the 1st of each month. Beside this letters are forwarded by the care of our Post Master, to all parts of the Europe by the earliest vessels, and the same care is taken of letters directed to South America, the West Indies, and indeed most other places. It is only necessary when letters are mailed in the interior to pay postage to New York in England, France, and most other parts of Europe, letters are forwarded to their destination, provided it is not beyond the limit of the government within which the ship arrives.
Sailed this morning in the brig Francis, for Puerto Cabello, on his way to the mines of Aroa, in the Province of Venezuela, in the Republic of Colombia, South America, Mr. Ezekiel Maynard, with nine men, and mechanical utensils, &c, for the Bolivar Mining Association, at the said mines.

The number of the Paris Révue Encyclopédique which has just been received in this city, contains an encomiastic notice of Mr. N. Biddle's beautiful commemoration of Jefferson's merits, delivered before the American Philosophical Society. We have translated a passage of the French opinion, as follows:—The mournful losses which the United States have recently sustained have furnished to the American orators, but too many occasions of worthily expressing the regrets of their fellow-citizens and proclaiming the national grief. In speaking of Jefferson before the American Philosophical Society, Mr. Biddle might have wished to exhibit that illustrious citizen only as the author, and

the friend of science; but could he forget that Jefferson was one of the founders of the Republic? And in thus considering him, could he fail to be loftily eloquent? The reader will find him so in the parallel between Jefferson and Napoleon. Materials for history are supplied in the opposition of the obstacle which stopped the traveller Ledyard at Kamtskatska, and the botanical excursion of Michaud in Kentucky. Jefferson would not be as well known as he deserved to be if this discourse of Mr. Biddle were not added to all that has been written about that great personage."

Extract of a letter from New Haven, dated Dec. 20.
This city was beautifully illuminated on Wednesday evening with transparencies, &c. in celebration of the Turkish defeat. The colleges and buildings adjoining presented a most imposing spectacle; every window was illuminated with lights so arranged, as to exhibit the figure of the Cross. The fine college band were stationed in the balcony of the Lyceum, and were accompanied vocally by songs of triumph. "The Mosaic has fallen, and Greece shall be free." These was the most exact order in lighting and extra gushing, and the utmost decorum prevailed. All gazed in silence and admiration, as if impressed with the idea that they contemplated the triumph of civilization, learning and religion over barbarism, ignorance and infidelity. If the flaming cross of Constantine itself had appeared in the heavens, I know not that the scene could have been more sublime.
