First Judicial District Court.
Clarisse Brigue, wife of Theophile Tregue, vs. O. CUVILLIER, Esqr. vs. Theodore Tregue her husband, Plaintiff, and the Court being satisfied from the proof that the dowry of the Plaintiff is in danger from the situation of the Defendant's affairs, order and adjudge that the Judgment by default taken in this case on the twenty-sixth day of December last, be now confirmed, and that a settlement of property take place between the Plaintiff and the Defendant, her husband; according to law. And the Court being moreover satisfied with the proof produced by the Plaintiff as to the dowry and other property brought by her in marriage as stated in the petition, order and adjudge that she recover of the Defendant the sum of three thousand one hundred and twenty-four dollars fourteen cents, being the amount brought by her in cash: And that she recover possession of the tract of land mentioned in her petition, and the Slaves and cattle therein described, viz.—One arpent of land fronting on the river by eighty in depth, a negro man named Alexis, a negro woman named Marianne, with her child named Louise, a horse of a cinnamon colour, and a bull with a young ox. And lastly, it is ordered that the Defendant pay costs*
