[From the New-York Evening Post.] Latent From Europe.—By the Fama, Capt. Pratt, which arrived at Boston on Friday last...

These papers contain a translation of the entire manifesto issued by the Ottoman Porte. It is believed to be a genuine document, but it does not by any means amount to an open and direct declaration of war.

The object of the Sultan is to be prepared for war and the manifesto is addressed to the public functionaries throughout the Turkish Empire...

Reports that the Russian army had crossed the Pruth had been repeated and contradicted. It is mentioned, that any proceeding of the kind would be a direct violation of the treaty of July 6th.

After the receipt of despatches from St. Petersburg a cabinet council was immediately convened, was fully attended, and sat two hours.

The Marquis of Anglesa had arrived at Holyhead on his way to Ireland. Five thousand additional troops were immediately to be sent from England to Bombay.

Reports of the illness of the British King's health continued to be circulated.—The last accounts were that he was better.
