According to a French paper, it appears that England has offered to France to furnish an army of ten thousand men for the expedition to Mexico.

Several ships of the line were fitting in London, and the government was to transport troops to Mexico.

But now that those two nations are no longer on such friendly terms, the Parisian thought it advisable to become friendly to some naval power and consequently the Duke of Saxe-Coburg has made certain proposals to Mr. Richard, an American agent now at Constantinople.

It is on the 16th of the present month that the American delegates of the Catholic Church are to leave the capital. They are principally taken to the southern parts of Italy.

The son of the Austrian Prince de Wagram, a young officer of Honour, is said to have taken the turban, and entered into the service of Turkey.

Judge Clark's proposition to increase the duty on Cotton Bagging to 5 cents per square yard, has been adopted by the House of Representatives.

Loss of British Shipping.—(Extracted from Lloyd's List of 1852.—370 vessels wrecked, 595 driven on shore, but 308 of them known to have been got off, and probably several others; 60 sunk; 35 abandoned at sea; 31 missing on decks; 13 condemned on shore; 6 burnt; 5 upset; 5 run down; 35 British vessels were taken by pirates, Buenos Ayres, and Columbian cruizers—13 of them afterwards retaken, and 11 given up; 41 were plundered by the Greeks of property to a very considerable amount.
