Yesterday afternoon, a man fell from the stern of the brig *Oregon*, and notwithstanding immediate efforts were made to save him, he was drowned. Yesterday morning, about 2 o'clock, a child about 6 months old was found at the entrance of the Bayou road.

The due observance of the Sabbath, says the Philadelphia Aurora of Wednesday, has lately received considerable attention in this city, and various meetings have been held and measures proposed, to lessen the evils complained of. Among these, steam boat excursions were especially censured, and means suggested to compel a discontinuance of the practice.—Without desiring to enter into the controversy upon the one side or the other, we think the annexed remarks of the National Gazette, upon the abstract question of coercion in matters of conscience, well conceived, of general applicability, and deserving full consideration.

"We have a special sensibility with regard to this scheme of coercion, because it is so frequently employed by individuals in relation to newspapers, and has nearly destroyed the independence of the press in our country. An editor does not lend himself to such and such a party, political creed, or public undertaking;—he does not study to gratify particular passions, prejudices, or interests;—therefore, though in abstaining he may be only obeying the dictates of his own conscience, and may otherwise provide the most useful and agreeable materials for his readers—still he is to be abandoned and patronage to be transferred to those who will recklessly or prodigally promote the effervescence or obliquity of the moment. We do not speak thus because we have ourselves suffered much in this way, or have reason to apprehend serious loss, but in consequence of our direct knowledge of prevailing dispositions and habits, and of the effect which they have produced to the great injury of the country."

According to a statement in an Alabama paper, the value of steam-boats and barges lost on the Alabama river for the last seven years, amounts to 378,000 dollars, and other losses are supposed to have been sustained sufficient to increase the amount to 400,000 dollars. For many months in the year this river is not navigable.

American Industry—Lowell, Mass. July 22. There are now seven mills in operation in this town, in which are manufactured weekly over 125,000 yards of cotton cloth. At Mr. Hurd's mills are weekly manufactured about 3000 yards of casimere.

Two other mills for the manufacture of cotton cloth, are now ready to receive the machinery when completed, and two more are now being erected, besides a very large building for a carpet factory.

The Picture of New-York, lately published by Mr Goodrich, states the population of that city in 1656, at 1000; in 1730, at 10,000; in 1776 23,619; in 1790, 33,131; in 1800, 60,419; in 1810, 96,363; in 1820, 123,706; in 1825, 166,086. If the population were to increase in the same ratio, it would in 1848, be 380,000; in 1863, 760,000; (not far from the population of Paris) and in 1888, 1,820,000, which is 300,000 more than the present population of London. If the environs, such as Brooklyn, and other places, go on in the same proportion, there would be then, in the city, and a surrounding circle of five miles, two millions of people. This would be realizing some of the apocryphal accounts of the populousness of ancient cities. The line of shipping in the port of New-York, extends at least three miles, and in some parts the vessels are crowded together in the closest manner. "A very different spectacle indeed," says the Journal of Commerce from that which must have been presented to the eye, in 1683, when it seems the whole shipping of the port was only 3 barques, 3 brigantines, 26 sloops, and 48 open boats—all told.

Important to Mariners in the Baltic Trade. Relative to Light Houses at Dantzic.—Regarding the lights of New Fairwater and Rosehead, the light at Rosehead has hitherto been extinguished on the 15th of May, every year, and lit again on the 1st of August; that of Fairwater was extinguished on the 25th

May, and re-lit on the 25th of September. It is now ordered that both lights, as well as the new light on the Heel arc to burn throughout the year, without intermission, from sunset till sunrise; which is hereby notified to all those concerned in shipping with the remark that the direction of the double light at New Fairwater has not been already by the building of the light house—Royal Prussian Regency Department of the Interior, Dantzic, May 11 1828.

A gentleman of Washington visited the town of Lowell Massachusetts, last Autumn. He saw in five cotton factories 1200 females employed. It was to him a most novel sight, and an interesting one—so large a number of females coming from various parts of New-England, industriously and usefully employed, of all ages from twelve to thirty, exhibiting great neatness and the most perfect order and quickness—healthy and cheerful—and above all, to learn that it had not been necessary to dismiss one of this great number for immodest or improper conduct.

A cargo of 2675 bales of cotton, (under deck) the largest ever shipped from the United States, was sent out in the ship *Washington*, from New-York, the 7th July.

The coinage of the United States' mint, last year, was \$3,022,675 32 cts viz: 131,565 of gold, 2,669,200 of silver, and \$1,910 32 of copper. The total amount coined since the establishment of the mint, 30,525,138 28 cents, of which probably not ten millions remain in the country, the residue having been forced abroad by the substitution of bank paper as a circulating medium. The neat amount chargeable to the mint, since its establishment, including the cost of lands, building and machinery, is only \$528,470 49

The steam boat belonging to and trading from New-York, consume, during a running season of about eight months, about 200,000 cords of pine wood. At Philadelphia there are 12 boats, besides ferries, which, with the neighbouring works and manufactures, consume annually about 150,000 cords.

STATE OF CRIME IN ENGLAND.—During the last seven years, there were 241 convictions for forgery, 111 for murder, 50 for arson, 43 for perjury, while the number of convictions for theft were not less than 45,000.
