That he said defendant remain responsible for and pay all the debts of the community as stated in the annexed schedule, that all the property belonging to the said community, now becomes the sole and exclusive property of the said defendant, on the conditions above mentioned, with a reservation in favor of the said Plaintiff of such rights, only as may derive from any errors which may exist, in the settlement of her rights as appears by the schedule hereto annexed.
