JOHN QUINCY ADAMS, President of the United States. TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: LOUIS MARIA DEL VALLE, having produced to me his commission as Consul of the United Mexican States, for the port of New-Orleans, in the State of Louisiana, and its dependencies, I do hereby recognize him as such, and declare him free to exercise and enjoy such functions, powers and privileges, as are allowed to the Consuls of the most favoured nations, in the United States.

There has scarce ever been a time when the politics of Europe were in a more unsettled state than at present;—certainly not since the restoration of the Bourbons in France. The movements of the great machine, both present and to come, are veiled in equal mystery, and of course the subject of extravagant apprehensions and absurd speculations in every quarter.

THE BLUCHER, which arrived at Liverpool on the 24th Sept. from N Orleans ran on the rock at Garnish Bay, Durzu Sound, near Bearhaven, on the 17th. but was got off next day, by assistance of the Coast Guard service. As soon as the country people saw her, they crowded on board, cut the rigging, and plundered a small quantity of cotton which was on deck.

By the President, H. CLAY, Secretary of State. M. L. M. DEL VALLE keeps his office in Dauphine street, No. 297. There has scarce ever been a time when the politics of Europe were in a more unsettled state than at present;—certainly not since the restoration of the Bourbons in France.

One of the French papers contemplates this result as a matter of course, and as near at hand, and affirms that it is not a matter of mere newspaper speculation, but that "it is gravely reasoned upon by persons in office." He divides off the parties thus: "At this moment Austria is arming from one end of the empire to the other her Cabinet, being, it is said, determined to throw every possible obstacle in the way of the frightful preponderance which Russia appears desirous of acquiring in Europe.

are taking place between the two Cabinets in furtherance of these views. They have succeeded, it is asserted, in securing the alliance and co-operation of Prussia. France alone sides with Russia; and it is said the English Government is perfectly convinced that a secret treaty has been entered into between these two Powers; though, notwithstanding numberless efforts, it (the English Government) has not yet been able to obtain a precise knowledge of its dispositions. According to this showing, then, on one side will be ranged England, Austria, Prussia, and the rest of Germany; and, on the other, Russia and France. If it be asked what is the object of this war? the answer is—to oblige Russia, in case she should get possession of Constantinople, not to dismember or destroy the Turkish empire; or, in case she should do so, to wrest Poland from her, re-establish it as an independent kingdom, and then by restore the counterpoise to the Russian power that would be lost by the extinction of Turkey.

Stipulations of the Treaty between Brazil and Buenos Ayres.—It will be seen, says the Baltimore Gazette, by the following letter which is from a source upon which the fullest reliance may be placed, that the report which we published on Saturday, of the cession of the Banda Oriental, to the Buenos Ayrean government, was not correct.—It would indeed have been strange that the Brazilian Government should have given up so suddenly and upon so little apparent necessity, its pretensions to a country, the possessions of which had, for a long time, been the chief cause of the protraction of the war.

RIO JANEIRO, 27th Aug. 1828. "THE TREATY with Buenos Ayres was signed yesterday evening—both parties cede all pretensions to the Banda Oriental—which is to have an Independent, subject to the approbation (or inspection) of both the contracting parties, for the sole purpose of preventing any article being introduced contrary to civil liberty. The Buenos Ayrean troops to retire from the Brazilian Territory in two months—hostilities to cease on land, on both Commanders being notified of the Treaty—immediate measures are to be taken to form a provisional government for the Banda Oriental.—1500 Brazilian Troops are to remain in Montevideo for the sole purpose of doing duty as police, for four months after the formation of a provisional government. War at sea to cease—at Buenos Ayres, in 24 hours after ratification of these articles—at Montevideo 48 hours—off Cape Frio, 20 days—off the Coast of Africa, 60 days, and in the European Seas, 80 days. Should the Treaty not take effect—an armistice is to take place, for five years. All these articles are guaranteed by Great Britain.—There is no doubt of the Treaty being ratified, as the Commissioners were ordered to accept much less advantageous terms, and they have now got all they could ask. The fair copies of the Treaty are not yet made out—nor will it be ready to be despatched for Buenos Ayres for two or three days. We have a large supply of Flour and but poor prospects for it—you will see by the Circular herewith, that I do not think it will be a good time to ship here immediately after peace—indeed, I am sure there will be a great deal of money lost on shipments.—There is a superabundance of Goods, of all kinds, ready to pour into Buenos Ayres—and there will be great disorder, bankruptcy and want of confidence there, when peace is made."—Jb.
