The annexed interesting article is translated from the "Phare du Havre" of the 28th October:—

Our countrymen, who have not been sensible to the compliment paid them by the Americans, in giving to the most of their pocket ships the names of some of our most celebrated Kings and great men, will see, with pleasure, mingled with them, that of one of the most distinguished citizens of the United States, the only surviving member of that assemblage of the wise, which drew the Declaration of Independence of the United States, and traced the basis upon which should rest the liberty and happiness of the nation—that one whom Providence has the longest permitted to enjoy the fruits of his talents, and to see, at an age protracted beyond the usual period, the immense progress which the constitution he bestowed upon his country has caused it to make in civilization, population, and wealth.

The United States and England.

The London Times of the 30th Oct. notices the publication by Parliament of a series of documents and official papers and letters concerning the Tariff laws of the United States, which it speaks of as likely to afford materials for future comment. The Times closes its article with the following:

"For the present, however, we content ourselves with quoting one short sentence from an able letter of Mr. H. U. Addison to Mr. Canning, bearing date May 30, 1824, wherein he accounts for the Tariff policy of America, in the following terms, which we trust will not be wholly overlooked by the landed oligarchy of England:—

"I have only to add, that had no restriction on the importation of foreign grain existed in Europe generally, and especially in Great Britain, I have little doubt that the Tariff would never have passed through either House of Congress, since the great agricultural States, and Pennsylvania especially, the main mover of the question, would have been indifferent, if not opposed, to its enactment."

"Upon this official assurance from a British Minister on the spot, we leave his Grace who rules the Treasury, to chew the cud for a little. Mr. Ad-dington's remark is sagacious, and, we believe, well founded."—[Nat. Int.]

[From the N. Y. Journal of Commerce.] *Scilly*.—In the afternoon of Sunday, 28th Oct. a boat was picked up by the crew of the boat *Hero*, of *Broder*, *Scilly*, being then 6 miles W. N. W. St. Agnes light house, containing a paper, of which the following is an exact transcript:—"New York packet ship *Leeds*, Capt. Sprague, at sea, June 25, 1828—Lat. 49, 49. N. lon. 30, 25, W. from London, bound to New-York, which place she left on the 13th inst. Died on board this morning, at 11 A. M. T. P. York, the well known and much respected philosopher. He was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him, and his loss will be most sincerely felt.—His remains were consigned to the turbulent ocean, with every mark of respect and regret, at 3 P. M. by his fellow passengers. This was justly celebrated as a philanthropist, and the sole motive of his undertaking the passage was to enlighten, with his profound learning, the inhabitants of the United States to whom he was much attached. Any person finding this, will please to send an account of the time it is picked up, and the place where it is found, to Lloyd's London for to the best newspaper, for the information of the friends of the deceased, and also for the benefit of the Board of Longitude, London.—W. J. Stanington"

Awful event.—A letter from Brussels (Picdmont) dated 13th September, gives the following details respecting the dreadful effects of lightning in a neighboring commune:—"Yesterday the 14th inst., they celebrated mass in the chapel of Romble, situated in the middle of an extensive meadow. About three o'clock in the day soon after they had commenced Vespers, a violent storm arose, and the lightning striking the choir of the chapel, killed four priests and two seculars. The Archpriest of Frescarolo, aged 60, was struck dead, but appeared sitting in the attitude of one who meditated. Near him they found upon the earth the Archpriest of Sernone, aged 50, without any external wound, also a tailor, aged 36. They found likewise near the door of the choir, an individual whose appearance was that of a man who had died quietly. By the side of the pulpit lay extended upon the earth the Archpriest of Spigarlo, blackened, his face, hands, and hair, burnt, his clothes were in rags. Near the body appeared that of the Cuse of Romble, in a sitting posture, the countenance expressed great pain and suffering, but no wound was visible."
