BUSINESS FOR THE NEXT SESSION.
 On Monday last, in the U. States' House of Representatives, Mr. McDuffie obtained leave to present the following resolution, the object of which we need not explain:—

Resolved, That the President of the United States be requested to cause to be communicated to this House, at an early period of the next session, the amount of the domestic productions annually exported from each of the United States since the year 1820; and as nearly as it can be ascertained and estimated, the amount of the said exports actually produced in each of the said States annually; also, the quantity and value and average price of the following articles respectively, and annually exported during the same period from each of the said States, viz: Cotton, Tobacco, Rice, Wheat, Indian Corn, Indian Corn-meal; also, the value of all the productions of agriculture; of all the productions of the fisheries; and of all the productions of manufactures respectively exported during the same period; also the value of the manufactures of Cotton and of Wool respectively exported during the same period, also, the amount of the disbursements of the Federal Government annually, made in each of the States and Territories; also the restrictions imposed by Foreign Governments upon the importation of the domestic productions of the United States into foreign countries, and whether any efforts have been made by the Government to procure an abolition of such restrictions by negotiation.

Gold.—The Fayetteville (N. C.) Observer, of the 12th March says—"The Gold Region in this State is enlarged by new discoveries almost every day. We learn that the precious article has lately been found in several places near Charhage, in Moore county, about 40 miles from this town."

Letters from Lima, of November 20th, state that the mines of Pascoe were full of water, and it was feared they could not be worked again in less than 8 or 10 months.—This would materially effect the business of the country, which had become extremely dull.

Duel.—On the morning of Monday the 9th March, an affair of honor took place between Charles E. Hawkins, Esq. of the Mexican Navy, late commander of the Mexican brig of war Herman, and William Allison M'Ken, Esq. U. S. Attorney for the Southern Judicial District of Florida, on a challenge given by the former to the latter. Four shots were exchanged on the ground.—The first ball of Capt. H. passed through the surtout of Mr. M'K. and was glanced—the second one thro' the pantaloons of Mr. M'K. near the waistband, bruising the body—the third ball passed through the hat of Mr. M'K.—and the fourth lodged in his thigh, near the body, on which the contest terminated.—The third shot of Mr. M'K. slightly grazed the wrist of Captain Hawkins.—Key- West Register.

NAVAL ENGAGEMENT.
 Extract of a letter to a gentleman in Philadelphia, dated Buenos Ayres private armed brig Guillermo Tell, Mensurado, 25th December, 1828. We are lying here repairing damages sustained in a running fight with a Spanish Guineaman, on the 11th inst. off the river Gallenas, on the north coast of Africa. We swept after him from daylight until 3 300 P. M. under English colors. Came along side and ordered him to send his boat on board with the Captain—he sent his boat with his supercargo; our first officer Mr. Smith, returned in this boat, with another officer and five men, with orders to send the Spanish Captain on board. At this time we shifted our flag, and Mr. Smith fell, mortally wounded, on her decks, he had three balls through him. Our boat shoved off, for they were unarmed, in doing which two of our men were shot along side of him. He immediately made all sail. On perceiving this

we gave him a broadside, and filled after him, and after three hours, with grape range, on his perceiving our intention of boarding, he struck. Our loss in killed and wounded were equal. We immediately took possession of her, and landed the Captain and crew at Cape Mount, and made sail for this port. We were well received and every possible assistance given us to refit. She had cut us up considerably. We have been endeavoring to make her seaworthy if possible, but she has so many shot holes through her, and one especially in the rudder post, that I am afraid we shall have to condemn her here. Had we attempted to have laid him on board after his hauling down his colours, we should have been blown into eternity together. The villain knowing his own culpability, and being afraid of our revenging the death of our officer and men on him, went down into the magazine, with a lantern and match, and swore, if we did not swear to show him mercy, that he would blow the vessel up. We were so near (our yards touching) and he having about half a cargo of powder, we should have gone up together. All his men were over the side forward, crying out for us to send our boats for them; however, in fifteen minutes we had complete possession of her and him. I have been in three or four actions previous, but this man fought to desperation, in fact, for the last hour, he kept his men to quarters with his pistols at their heads; and when his men deserted him, he took the desperate resolution of blowing her up."—Philadelphia Chronicle.

From Lima.—Letters were received in this city yesterday from Panama, to 28th Jan. which state, that the Peruvian and Colombian Fleets, the former under the command of Admiral Guise, met under the walls of Guayaquil, and a severe action commenced—it continued long, without however, being decisive to either party. About 500 were killed, amongst them, Admiral Guise (an Englishman) whose body had arrived at Lima, preserved in a puncheon of spirits. No farther particulars of the battle, or its result are given.

 "The acclamations which repeatedly interrupted the delivery of the speech from the throne will be re-echoed by all France; and there is not a single Frenchman who has read the discourse and attentively considered it, who does not participate in the confidence which filled the souls of those who had the good fortune to hear it. One is sensible, indeed, of the weight and force which must have been added to the authority of the Royal words by the accent of conviction and frankness with which they were pronounced: never, indeed, was there a better verification of the saying of a Prince, that "the countenance of the King is a messenger of joy." Those who have not heard the speech from the mouth of Charles X., but who know the loyalty and the religious virtues of our well-loved monarch, will, in reading it, believe that they listened to it, so strongly does the soul of the sovereign breathe throughout the composition, and with such energetic sincerity does it exhibit the wishes of a good King for the happiness of his subjects, his unalterable attachment both to the character and the institutions which spring from it, his zeal for the national glory as inseparable from the dignity of his crown,—so positive and explicit are the promises it contains of ameliorations desired in different parts of our legislation—so much, in fine, in a few lines, which permit to hope for every thing, does there appear of certainty that our hopes will be this time irrevocably realized.
