HAVING been since the commencement of the year 1824 constantly engaged in making experiments for ascertaining the best method of constructing Saw-Mills: I feel myself authorized (having previously examined with attention the laws of the United States relative to the encouragement of Arts) to claim from the general government the exclusive right of making use of a movement of Saws of less than 16 inches in length.

According to the information I have received from persons well instructed on such matters it appears that the use of movement of Saws of 18 or 20 inches in length has entirely ceased, and those of 24, of 30, and even of 36 inches have been substituted in their place, as it is believed that the longer is the movement the greater is the advantage. From my own experience I am convinced of the contrary, I have ascertained that the shorter the movement is the better provided in all cases that it be greater than the length of two teeth of the Saws. I would request the Judges and other magistrates of the different parishes and counties of the United States, to observe the Saw-Mills established in their parish, or county, and to remark the length of the movement of the Saws. I shall consider all persons as making use of my invention who make use of Saws having less than 16 inches of movement.
