**Important from the Mediterranean.**  
We have it from a source which is entitled to the fullest confidence, that in the early part of December, David Ofley, Esq. American Consul at Smyrna, proceeded to Constantinople, to negotiate a passage for the U. S. sloop of war Fairfield, captain Parker, to that city, having a gentleman on board who was the bearer of a Treaty to be entered into between the American Government and the Porte. Its purport was not known; but the importance attached to it by Commodore Crane, may be inferred from the fact, that, though in feeble health, he left his flag-ship and went on board, for the purpose of accompanying the embassy to Constantinople. On the 14th December, the Fairfield was at the mouth of the Dardanelles, and as soon as permission was received would go up to the "famous city."

It has been judicially decided at Charleston, South-Carolina, that money lost at a gaming table, not being the property of the loser, is recoverable at law from the winners.

**St. Kitts.**—A passenger in the Ann Maria, who arrived at Norfolk the 15th inst. from St. Barts, brings information that the Governor of St. Kitts had received orders from England to have the fortifications and barracks put in good repair, and to erect some new ones, as it was the intention of government to send out troops, and to make that island the central depot.

The British ship Agincourt, a regular packet from Bristol, bound to Nevia, with a cargo estimated at 30,000 sterling, was lost the latter part of February, on the N. side of Antigua, about 3 miles from the shore.

We remarked a few days ago, in one of the New-York papers, an appeal to public sympathy in favor of a murderer, on the ground that he perpetrated his crime under the influence of the strongest of passions. The case is—the deliberate assassination of a woman by her paramour, after a long illicit connection.—Generally, we are opposed to the punishment of death, and should be glad to see, even in this instance, a commutation—but no relaxation of legal rigour ought to be conceded to such a plea as the one here mentioned. It is against the excesses of passion, that penal sanctions are chiefly directed. The grim terrors of the code are particularly required to prevent the indulgence of the fiercer humours. Even small offences are visited with a severity proportioned to the proneness of culprits to commit them, or the probable frequency of their occurrence. Intoxication with liquor, is deemed in the courts an aggravation of crime. The headlong fury of jealous resentment does not deserve to be viewed in a more favorable light.

Burke, of Edinburgh, butchered his victims from the want of bread; or the thirst of gain;—the highwayman and the burglar give the excuse of necessity. Whatever the impulse to guilt, some suppression or aberration of the reason may ever be alleged and admitted. In this mode, however, sentimentalists might argue or whine away the whole body of crimes and punishments. We were struck and shocked with the theatrical speech of the Bench, which was prepared for Johnson, on his conviction. Nothing could be more false or mischievous than the rhetorical distinction between moral and legal murder. He had intentionally shot the woman who was attached to him; yet he was made to boast that the sentence of the law did not fall upon his conscience!—It is the duty of every true friend of humanity and order to protest against perverted sensibilities or sophistical refinements, which find warrant or apology for depraved appetites,—for the worst distemperature of the mind and the most fatal catastrophes,—in natural propension and unrestrained feeling. Spurious sympathy is a more prolific evil than sanguinary rigor, useless and pernicious as the latter is in our humble opinion. Public executions do greater harm than good—but are not worse than morbid public commiseration and entreaty for criminals, to whom the real justice of the law has been applied, after fair and merciful trial.

**Constantinople.**—It appears by a calculation made so recently as August last, that the population of Constantinople—including all the suburbs, which had been variously estimated at from

400,000 to 600,000—does not exceed 380,000; and that the number of houses of every description, is about 85,000. The number of persons capable of bearing arms in Constantinople, to the entire population, is said to be very small.

**Commercial Enterprise.**—During the dominion of Buonaparte, sugar, coffee, cotton, tobacco, cotton-twist, &c. were sent by sea from London to Salonica (in European Turkey,) whence these goods were carried on horses & mules, across Servia and Hungary, into the whole of Germany, and even into France; so that goods were consumed at Calais, coming from England, only seven leagues distant, which goods had made a circuit equivalent, as far as expense went, to a voyage twice round the world!

**Cure for Tooth Ache in Mexico.**—The application of spirits in the ear is practised in Mexico as a constant and specific remedy for the most violent pains in the head, especially those arising from the tooth ache. It is inserted by a syringe, or more frequently by the mouth of the operator, into the ear opposite to that side of the face where the pain lies, and is suffered to remain in till the pain leaves the patient, which is said to do in the course of three or four minutes; the whole effect being doubtlessly produced by what is called counteraction.—The sensation to the patient is by no means distressing; it resembles the whizzing experienced on immersion of the head under water, but is more astounding. The mode of operation is this—the patient lies down on the side on which the pain is seated, and the spirit is poured into the ear which is uppermost.—*Mor. Cour.*

**THE LIFE OF SWIFT BY SIR WALTER SCOTT.**  
The life of Swift forms an interesting and instructive narrative to all who love to contemplate those alternations of good and evil which chequer the fate of individuals, distinguished by their talents and by their fame.—Born under circumstances of the most pressing calamity, educated by the cold and careless charity of relations, denied the usual honors attached to academic study, and spending years of dependence upon the inefficient patronage of Sir William Temple, the earlier part of his history may be considered as a continued tale of depressed genius and disappointed hopes. Yet, under all these disadvantages, Swift arose to be counsellor of a British administration, the best defender of their measures, and the intimate friend of all who were noble or renowned, learned or witty, in the classic age of Queen Anne. The events of his latter years were not less strongly contrasted. Involved in the fall of his patrons, he became a discontented and persecuted exile from England, and from his friends, yet almost at once, attained a pitch of popularity which rendered him the idol of Ireland, and the dread of those who ruled that kingdom. Nor was his domestic fate less extraordinary—loving, and beloved by two of the most beautiful and interesting women of the time, he was doomed to form a happy and tranquil union with neither, and saw them sink successively to the grave, under the consciousness that their mortal disease had its source in disappointed hopes, and ill-requited affection.—His talents also, the source of his fame and his pride, whose brilliancy had so long dazzled and delighted mankind, became gradually clouded by disease, and converted by passion, as their possessor approached that goal of life, and ere he attained it, were levelled far below those of ordinary humanity.—From the life of Swift, therefore, may be derived an important lesson, that, as misfortunes should induce genius to despair, no rank or fame, however elevated, should encourage its possessor to presumption. And those to whom fate has denied such brilliant qualities, or to whom she has refused the necessary opportunities of displaying them, may be taught, while perusing the history of this illustrious man, how little happiness depends upon the possession of transient talents, of political influence, or of popular renown.
