New-Orleans.—At the sitting of the City-Council, on Saturday last, the only thing of importance that took place was a motion made by Mr. Rodriguez and approved by the Council, having for object the naming of a committee to examine into the present system of the City Police and that said committee should also recommend such measures as would prove advantageous in cases of incendiary. The following gentlemen were named on said committee: Messrs. Rodriguez, Field and Blanc.

Baton-Rouge, June 20.
On Wednesday 10th inst. the steam boat Columbia, capt. Crane, struck a snag in the neighbourhood of Lafourche on her passage to Louisville. The boat was not sunk, but the damage she received obliged the captain to land the cargo immediately.

A runaway mulatto belonging to Mr. James Bowie, passed himself at Alexandria, for Gen. Ross, an Indian Chief engaged in conducting a party of Cherokees to the Arkansas Territory; and he played his part so well that several persons were actually taken in by him.

On the evening of the 11th instant three individuals confined in the prison of this town succeeded in making their escape. At the instant the keeper was bringing their allowance they rushed upon him gagged and tied him, and politely wished him a good night.

U. S. Troops.—A detachment of 270 U. S. Infantry, destined to reinforce our western posts upon the upper lakes and on the Mississippi, embarked on the steamboat Henry Clay, at this port, on Wednesday last, for Green Bay. The following officers accompany the detachment, viz: Captain Smith, Lieuts Loring, Morris, Long, Brown, Collins, and Gardiner. M. J. Kirby, paymaster, and Messrs. Griswold and Clark, soldiers.—[Buffalo Journal.]

Extract of a letter, received at Baltimore, dated
Cape Hayti, May 8, 1829.

"The government has laid an increased duty of 10 per cent on the duties and port charges of American vessels. This measure is said to be in consequence of Haytien vessels not being admitted to an entry in the United States on the same terms as American vessels. The brig Stork was the first that paid this extra charge, although she merely stopped to try the market. That we may fully be understood, suppose the duty on an American cargo amount to \$4000, at ten per cent would be 400, and the port charges, tonnage, officers fees, &c. at least 200 dollars, and ten per cent on that amount also, 20 dollars, at once it will be seen that an American vessel on those amounts will be obliged to pay 420 more than any other flag.

Things at Washington.—An intelligent friend who has just returned from Washington, writes us, that the "great essentials are going right.—The President looks, personally, into every thing with a keen, scrutinizing, military coup-d'œil and is daily detecting and correcting abuses. He frequently visits the Executive Offices, supervises the proceedings of the subordinate functionaries and directs and stimulates them by his presence. In a recent visit to the Navy Department hearing that the books belonging to that branch of the public administration were very much behind-hand, by the neglect of the late incumbents he addressed himself to the clerks, told them there were a great many applicants for their places and if they did not bring up the arrears of business he would soon find men that would. I mention this as a sample of the spirit, which now exists at Washington, and as one of the fruits of having a Military Chief at the head of affairs. The President is determined that neither himself nor any of his officers shall eat the bread of idleness."

The following paragraph is from the Georgia (Milledgeville) Journal:—

authority that the policy to be pursued by General Jackson's administration is decidedly more favourable to southern interests and in accordance with southern opinions, than the last; even more so than we had reason to anticipate.— This is a direct and positive assurance in which we place the highest confidence both on account of the quarter from the fact that it is confirmed by extraneous circumstances. In the first place it was announced simultaneously in Charleston and Philadelphia extracts from which annunciations we published in our last paper that the administration was to take a decided stand against the protective tariff. This was the best news we had heard for a long time. In the second place, the facts communicated in Gen. Thompson's letter, published in our last were of a character that could not be mistaken.—They are as strong as any thing that can be in favour of the presumption that on this point the southern policy is to prevail. We shall wait with much anxiety for the full development of this anticipated policy. And if it should be such as these givings out, by no means ambiguous lead us to expect it will go a great way to atone for the extreme mortification many of the president's best friends in the southern states, have both felt and expressed, at several of his appointments.

The York, Pa. Recorder states, that great damage was done to crops, fences and other property in the south eastern section of that country, by an excessive fall of rain on Tuesday week. The oldest inhabitants in the neighborhood assert that they never before witnessed such an outpouring of the waters. It appears also, that much injury was done by the storm on the same day in Lancaster country. The Journal states that six barns were consumed by lightning, several mill dams destroyed, and one or two millhouses injured.—The Congress rose with great rapidity, and several racks and rafts, from near Safe Harbor, were carried down the Susquehanna—their fate not yet ascertained.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.
PARIS, April 21.
"It seems that leave of absence, asked by M. de Chateaubriand, was despatched to him yesterday by a courier. It is said that the committed of the budget will not make its report on the laws of the finances before the middle of the month of May. It is affirmed that towards the end of the month, the Minister of Commerce will present to the Chambers a project of the law on the duties of customs.

M. Royer, Prussian Ambassador extraordinary from Berlin for Vienna. A letter from Trieste says—The Greek troops, have made themselves masters of the Castle of Lepanto. Missolonghi is negotiating for a capitulation with a brother of Count Capo d'Istria. Gen. Church was in possession of the defiles of the mountains, so that the communications of the Turks with the garrisons in Livadia are intercepted. The Turks are under some uneasiness respecting Albania.

PARIS, April 20.
The staff of the four regiments of the line which remain in the Morea are to return to France for the sake of economy. It is said they will leave only one battalion in which all the soldiers will be incorporated. Two Lieutenant Colonels will remain to command the four battalions of the 27th, 42d, 54th and 58th Regiments of the line which will each consist of 1000 men.—Major General Schneider will have the chief command of these troops.

LONDON, April 24.
The Duke of Wellington having settled the Catholic question, seems to have already commenced the formidable task of prescribing to Russia certain conditions respecting the Turkish war. It is said that France and England have joined in a note to the Autocrat, the terms of which are by no means agreeable to the Emperor of all the Russia. Out of between 30 and 40 clothing establishments recently existing in Gloucestershire we are informed that not more than four are at present at work and that instead of working regularly received orders, they are keeping on their factories with reduced hands and reduced wages merely in the hope of better times.—[Bath Jour.]

At the funeral of Mrs. O'Dwyer, of Cashel, sister to Mr. Nicholas Mahon, of Dublin, the Protestant and Roman Catholic clergy walked last week arm-in-arm and remained while the priest was reading the burial service in the graveyard.—[Clonmel paper.]

FRANKFURT April 17.—Letters from St. Petersburg of the 6th inst. says— "We cannot recollect a time when there was such a continual exchange of couriers as at present. The most active correspondence seems to be with Prussia and Sweden, while Count Nesselrode has almost daily conferences with the English and French Ambassadors. The Emperor will leave the capital, and preparations are making in the hotels of Count Nesselrode and of the two above-mentioned Ambassadors which seem to indicate that their Excellencies are going to leave them.

"The murder of the Russian Ambassador at Teheran has made a very unfavorable impression here and it is not thought another Ambassador will be sent thither till the Emperor of Persia shall have given satisfaction and security for future. "A plan is said to be in contemplation considerably to increase the Russian navy."

Forgery.—We understand that an extensive Forgery has been committed by a Droggist in this city, by the name of Parmele, by means of which, he has succeeded in passing off his own Notes, with a forged endorsement of the name of a near relative, for a large amount. The party guilty of this offence has gone off, and no clue is yet found to the route he has taken.—[Mercantile of New-York.]
