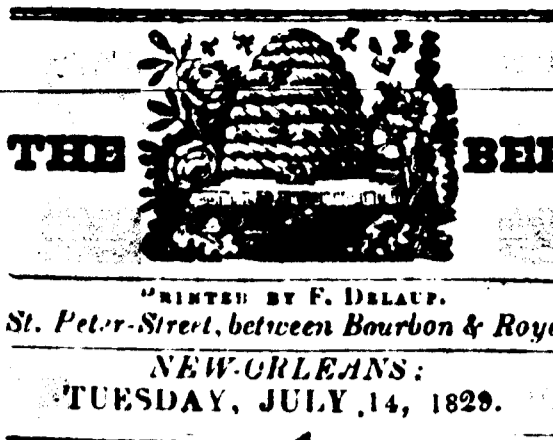

Baton Rouge, July 11. A Coroner's Inquest was held on the 6th inst. on the body of a negro man, in the rear of Mrs. H. Thomas's plantation on the Highlands—Verdict of the Jury, that he came to his death from the discharge of a gun loaded with large shot, fired at him by Mr. Jean Baptiste Picou while in the act of aiming at said Picou with a shot-gun, which he had stolen from the house of Mr. Paul Thomas on the same day. Said negro was about 25 years of age, branded on the breast with the letters C. A., had a large iron collar round his neck and most shockingly cut with the whip.

Boston, June 16. Brig Emily Cook, Lane, which sailed from this port, 28th March for Omoa, on her outward passage, when 2 days out, South Sea, N. W. 100 miles, fell in with schr. Lady Brooks, of Newburyport, full of water, nothing standing but her bowsprit, no person to be seen on board. The Lady Brooks, Captain sailed from Newburyport, 21st March, for N. Orleans and some articles of her cargo were picked up drift a few days afterwards, but no account has been before received of the vessel.

(From the American Mercury) It can no longer be concealed that many of the followers of the "Christian" have become alarmed for the stability of the present administration. This is no ways surprising, when we consider of what materials the party who at present support Andrew Jackson, "right or wrong," is composed. Violent federalists, fence men and a few restless office seekers from the republican party, have amalgamated, in hopes of obtaining places of honor and profit, under an administration whose only rule of conduct, as declared by its official organ, is, to "reward its friends, and punish its enemies." A party composed of materials so discordant, cannot long be kept together. General Jackson may exert himself to the utmost to subsidize the press; pay every venal editor his price—bestow valuable offices, as a reward to profigate politicians for having failed in being elected to one by the people—he may establish a system of proscription and persecution towards those who have the independence to think for themselves—may drive from every place under the government, faithful public servants, "the heroes of two wars," and place in their stead the upstarts of a day, having no claims upon the public confidence, or upon the patronage of the government, except for their low and vulgar abuse of the late administration, and syncretic adulation of the "hero." We say, he may "reward his friends, and punish his enemies" to the extent of his power, but a party composed of such materials can not long be kept together.

Those who have been deceived into a support of the present administration, (and their number is not small) will abandon it as soon as they have witnessed the effects of the reform, and the system of persecution which is now in operation. Those office seekers, who, with high expectations, joined in the shout of "hurra for Jackson," (and they constitute a majority of the party in this quarter) having found themselves not within the reach of "reform," will with the same feelings join in any other party that may arise, while the fence men will find no difficulty in again mounting the topmost rail, to be ready to dismount and join a victorious party.

The alarm and uneasiness manifested by a portion of Jackson editors, convinces us that they do not feel that security which another portion pretend to. They see in every cloud, and hear in every breeze, something that portends ruin to their schemes and hopes. The name of HENRY CLAY appears to haunt their disturbed imaginations, and rise like a ghost before them at every turn. And well it may;—they have pursued him with slanders most foul, and persecutions that would disgrace the most savage barbarians. One of their editors recommends, in the true spirit of the party, "to pursue him, nor let him find a resting place on this side of the grave;" and every member of the clan from Jack-

son their head, down to the humble scribes of the Times, ("modest democrats") have lent their aid to carry this fiend-like proposition into effect,—and yet HENRY CLAY survives their malice and their power. The people of this country will not tamely stand idle, and see one of the brightest ornaments of this or any other nation, hunted down by the blood hounds of General Jackson. They may be deluded for a while, but sooner or later their better judgements will prevail, and then HENRY CLAY will be called to that station he is so eminently qualified to fill. When the noisy demagogues, who now surround Jackson and compose his cabinet, shall have been laid aside, and with Aaron Burr forgotten or despised,—when the pimps and panders of their power shall have been brushed away, as useless and cumbersome rubbish, his name will be mentioned with veneration by every patriot tongue, and with that band of patriots who have devoted their lives to the cause of their country and of civil liberty throughout the world, will form a memorial for posterity, more durable than monuments of marble or brass.

No wonder the minions of Andrew Jackson should stand in fear of such a man. No wonder they should feel their own insignificance and shrink at the comparison of their own unworthiness and that of their idol, at the bare mention of such a man as HENRY CLAY.

Washington, June 20. The Louisville Focus republishes the letter of introduction to General Wilkinson which Aaron Burr gave to Samuel Swartwout, as well as the letter written by Burr in cypher, which Swartwout "slept" into the hands of General Wilkinson, at the time when he delivered his introductory letter. The letter in cypher ran thus: "The Gods invite to glory and fortune; it remains to be seen whether we deserve the boon; the bearer of this goes express to you; he will hand a formal letter of introduction to you from Burr: he is a man of inviolable honor and perfect discretion; formed to execute rather than project; capable of relating facts with fidelity, and incapable of relating them otherwise; he is thoroughly informed of the plans and intentions of—and will disclose to you as far as you inquire, and no farther; he has imbibed a reverence for your character, and may be embarrassed in your presence; put him at ease and he will satisfy you. 29th July."

The Focus also publishes the result of the subsequent examination of Swartwout by General Wilkinson, in order to make him acquitted with Burr's plans. After this elucidation of the character of Samuel Swartwout, the Focus asks— "Why has President Jackson given him an office worth \$5000 a year?— [Collector of New-York]—Was it to bribe him to disclose the whole particulars of the Burr plot, whereby Jackson's innocence could be fully established? Or, was it given for other, and opposite purposes?"

(From the American.) The Life of De Witt Clinton, by DAVID HOSACK, M. D. F. R. S. Europe will here observe what may be effected by the energies of a free people, and will learn how inferior are the gaudy trophies of her fields of battle, and the pillars of her Aristocracy, to the power of a nation whose greatness rests on the solid rock of Republican liberty.

North Carolina Gold Region.— A gentleman who has recently returned to New-York from an agency to this region, has ascertained that at least 100,000 acres of the lands of his employers are impregnated with gold, and has brought specimens of the ore. In one place eighty men are employed in working a mine, and the product of their labor is about \$500 a day. A number of crucibles have been dug up, which were composed of soap stone, and must have

been buried there for ages. It is therefore evident that the mines must at some remote period have been known to and worked by, the Indians gold rings and rude articles of jewelry and others found in the possession of the Aborigines of that country, on the first settlement of the whites, but where the precious metal came from, has not until this time been known.

A gentleman of Michigan has invented a machine for printing letters, &c. It is furnished with keys and played upon after the manner of a piano forte, and occupies about the fourth part of the space of a forte piano, and a young lady seated at it, and employed in printing a letter or card of invitation, would appear in the same attitude as in playing upon her forte piano. It will require a few hours practice, to enable one print with the same rapidity as he can write; but it may be so contrived as to print two or three copies at once. A child of five years, if it can spell, can take a copy of any thing placed before it; and those who write an awkward hand, aged persons, those who wish to have their letters, compositions &c. appear in a neat manner and "in print," in fine, all who ever write letters or any thing else, will fall in love with this invention.

From the Baltimore Gazette, June 13. We mentioned some time ago a new invention of a paper manufacturer of Paris which had attracted much attention. It appears that in addition to the manufacture of Damask Table Cloths to all appearance as fine, brilliant and soft to the touch as the best Silesian linen, made of the papier-linge, the manufacturer has recently extended his experiments to that of embroidered tulles for light draperies and ball dresses—and imitating silk to hang round drawing rooms, the paper texture of which cannot be detected even by the touch.—They are now selling at from four to five sous the French yard, and in the greatest perfection. The last-mentioned article is stamped with the most graceful arabesques in various colours. The solidity and brilliancy of this curious new manufacture are said to equal its beauty and delicate texture.
