About this we believe there is no doubt. If it be the truth, there must have been some grossly improper conduct in producing the above mentioned result, for if fourteen members voted for Mr. Smith, there was no choice, and Mr. Bowne is not Mayor."



From Mexico.—By the schooner Maria Venancio, arrived here from Campeachy, accounts from Mexico to the 4th of January have been received. It appears that the system of a Central government will be established, general Bustamante having succeeded to drive from office President Guerrero. During the vacancy of the presidency the affairs of the government will be conducted by Dr. Pedro Valez, general Quintana and Dr. Lucas Alaman. G.-n. Santa Anna remains neutral during all the commotion.

CHARLESTON, Jan. 14

Late from N.-Y.—By the line schooner Nile, 4 days from New-York, we have received the papers of that city to Friday last, 8th inst. inclusive. There had been no later foreign arrivals at that port.

The Legislature of the State met at Albany on Monday, 4th inst. The Hon. Wst. M. Oliver was elected President protem. of the Senate, having 21 votes, and Gen. E. Root, Speaker of the House of Representatives—result of the ballot: E. Root, 93, Francis Granger, of Ontario, 30, and 4 blanks. Some parts of the Message of Gov. Throop, at the opening of the session, are not well relished by the Anti-Tariff papers in the city of New-York. The Government speaks of a period "fast approaching, if not already arrived, in which it will be necessary for us to supply our wants by our own industry"—

that "international commerce will be restricted to fewer or other articles," and "our pursuits necessarily become more diversified." The attention of the Legislature is particularly called to the articles of silk, wine and hemp, which "have hitherto partially attempted with great success, but which have not hitherto come within the range of agricultural operations, for want of a knowledge of the process for producing them."

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CONGRES.

DEC. 22.

In the Senate, yesterday, various Petitions and Memorials were presented and referred, and Resolutions submitted.—The Bill for the adjustment of Land Claims in Missouri was read a second time, and ordered to be engrossed. Some time was spent in the consideration of Executive business.

In the House of Representatives, a number of Petitions were presented and referred. Various bills were then reported by some of the Committees, and were read twice and committed. The House then took up the consideration of the Resolution relating to a National Armory on the Western Waters. A brief discussion took place; all the amendments were rejected and the Resolution was then adopted in its original form.

December 23.—In the Senate yesterday a joint resolution was adopted to adjourn the two Houses till Monday. A bill to provide for the payment of sundry citizens of the Territory of Arkansas for trespasses committed upon their property by the Osage Indians, in the years 1815, 1817, and 1822; and a bill for the final adjustment of private land claims in Missouri, were severally read a third time and passed.

In the House of Representatives, various petitions and resolutions were presented and referred to appropriate Committees. A bill was reported by Mr. McDowell from the Committee of Ways and Means, providing for an equipment for the Frigate Brandywine. A joint resolution from the Senate to adjourn the two Houses until Monday, was read twice and referred to the engrossing committee, to a vote of 70 to 62; but the eyes and noses being called on its passage, the resolution was subsequently rejected by a vote of 121 to 62.

December 24.—In the Senate yesterday a resolution submitted by Mr. Holmes, was adopted, directing the Secretary of the Treasury to report to the Senate what funds of the United States, deposited in the State Banks of the District of Columbia, have been directed to be withdrawn since the session of Congress of 1824; what sums still remain in such Banks; at what times the transfers were respectively directed; and in what cases such funds are safe, unsafe, or doubtful.

A great many petitions were presented yesterday in the House of Representatives. The various Committees then made numerous reports, by bills and otherwise. The joint resolution offered on the preceding day, by Mr. Davis of South Carolina, to extend the privilege of the Library of Congress, was referred to the Joint Committee on the Library.

Several resolutions, calling for information were then laid on the table; and a number of resolutions were adopted. Three bills received from the Senate were read twice and referred to appropriate Committees. The House then went into a Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union, and took up the bill making an appropriation for repairing and fitting out the frigate Brandy Wine; which was reported without amendment, and ordered to be engrossed and read a third time to-day. The House then, in Committee of the Whole, passed upon nine private bills, which were ordered to be engrossed and read a third time to-day.

Dec. 25.—In the Senate yesterday various petitions, memorials, and resolutions, were presented and acted on, and several bills were passed. The Senate adjourned until Monday. In the House of Representatives a variety of petitions and resolutions were offered and referred. The various bills which on the preceding day had been ordered to a third reading were passed; and the House in Committee acted upon a variety of other private bills. Various resolutions of minor importance were adopted; and the resolutions laid on the table the preceding day were agreed to. On motion of Mr. Everett, a Committee on Eurodol Bills was ordered to be appointed. The House then adjourned till Monday.
