WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 3, 1830.

Arrived at the Belize, on Monday last, the U. S. ship Palfmout, commanded by Mr. Poinsot, from Tampico, having on board, Mr. Poinsot, minister plenipotentiary of the United States to Mexico, J. Mason Jr. secretary of legation, Count Lillieries, of France, W. H. Keating of Philadelphia, G. Fisher, of Alisissipi, Francke and Marek, of Germany, and Duncan, of New-York. They came up last night, in the steamer Atlas, with W. P. Jones, midshipman of the Falmouth.

Nothing had been heard of the sloop of war Hornet.

LOUISIANA LEGISLATURE. SENATE.

Wednesday, January 27, 1830.

Mr. Kerr offered the following resolution.

“Resolved, That hereafter, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the Senate from time to time to examine and correct the copy of the journal before it is sent to the printer, and sign his name to it after he ascertains its accuracy”—which resolution was adopted.

Mr. Kerr introduced the following resolution.

“Resolved, That a committee of two members be appointed to examine the journal of the Senate of the present session, and report whether any, and if any, what errors or omissions have been made, and also to examine the printed journal so far as it has been published, and to report any errors or omissions therein. And the resolution being adopted, Messrs. Kerr and Derbigny were appointed on said committee.

Mr. Leblanc requested that a committee be appointed to examine the accounts of Mr. Beauvais while acting Governor, and a resolution for that purpose having been adopted, Messrs. Kerr and Derbigny were appointed thereon.

Mr. Leblanc also requested that leave of absence be extended to Mr. Beauvais for three days, which was granted by the Senate.

Mr. Thomas, of Baton Rouge, having requested the reconsideration of the resolution introduced by Mr. Leblanc relative to the examination of the accounts of Mr. Beauvais, and the Senate having concurred in the request, introduced the following resolution.

“Resolved, That a committee composed of two members on the part of the Senate, and members of the house of representatives be appointed for the purpose of examining the accounts of Mr. Beauvais while acting Governor; and the said resolution hav-

ing been adopted, Messrs. Morgan of St. Tammany, and Leblanc, were appointed on said committee on the part of the Senate.—Ordered that the clerk request the concurrence of the house of representatives therein.

A message from the house of representatives informed the Senate that on account of the indisposition of their speaker, the said house had chosen Mr. Octave Labranché speaker protopresident.

Mr. Thomas of Rapides, requested the Senate to dispense with the rules, and proceed to the first reading of the bill entitled “an act to abolish the district courts and to establish circuit courts in lieu thereof, and for other purposes,” which, being granted, the said bill was read for the first time in English only, and sent to the translator to be translated in French—and the French text ordered to be printed immediately.

On motion, the Senate went into the consideration of executive business with closed doors—and on re-opening the same there was a recess.

The Senate having resumed their sittings, a message from the house of representatives by Mr. Canonge their clerk, informed the Senate, that the house had concurred in the resolution, the object of which was to examine the accounts of Mr. Beauvais while acting Governor, and that Messrs. Hamilton, W. Kuff and Lalonde had been appointed on the part of the house and that the said house requested the concurrence of the Senate in the following resolution.

Resolved, That a committee composed of seven members of the house and members of the Senate, be appointed to take into consideration the message of the acting Governor of the state, bearing date the 26th inst. relative to and enclosing certain resolutions and report made in and adopted by the house of representatives of the state of Mississippi, on the subject of opening a road from Burlington to New-Orleans, and the establishment of a ferry at Pe-tite-Coquille; and that Messrs. Hamilton, Crane, Wyton, Labranché, Wheeler, Mouton and Martin had been

appointed on said committee on the part of the house—and the Senate having filled the blank with the word three, adopted the above resolutions and Messrs. Morgan of St. Tammany, Derbigny and Randall were appointed on said committee on the part of the Senate.

Ordered, that the Secretary inform the house of representatives thereof.

The same message requested the concurrence of the Senate to the bill entitled “act for the relief of Hubert Charnier, Joseph Dugat and Celestin Landry,” which was read for the first time.

Another message from the house of representatives by Mr. Canonge their clerk, informed the Senate that the speaker pro tem. had signed the bill entitled “an act to incorporate the Pontchartrain rail road company;” and then the president signed the said bill.

On motion, the Senate adjourned to-morrow 10 o’clock a.m.

Thursday, 28th January, 1830.

The Senate met according to adjournment.

A written message from the Governor or his private secretary, Mr. Delahousse, was received.

Mr. Derbigny requested that leave of absence for 10 days be granted to Mr. Brownson, on account of indisposition, which was granted by the Senate.

Mr. Root also requested that leave of absence be granted to Mr. Trouvère for three days, as that gentleman had been appointed one of the directors of the Consolidated Association, and that it was necessary for him to repair to New Orleans in order to be present at the election of the president of said institution.—Leave was granted.

Mr. Derbigny from the committee to whom had been referred the position of the inhabitants of the Chenière Caminada, reported the following bill; “an act relative to the Chenière Caminada,” which bill had its first reading.

Mr. Kerr requested that the first resolution introduced by him yesterday, relative to the Journal of the Senate be reconsidered.—The re-consideration was granted.

Mr. Kerr then moved to amend the same by introducing the following resolution as a substitute.

Resolved, that hereafter, until otherwise ordered by the Senate, the Secretary shall read the Journal daily, from the sheets on which he takes his minutes, and that after being so read and corrected, and not before, the said minutes shall be recorded in the books and transmitted thereafter, the journal so recorded shall be examined by the secretary of the Senate, and if necessary, corrected or amended under the sanction of the Senate, and copies in both languages promptly furnished to the printer, authenticated by the signature of the secretary.

Which amendment was adopted.

Mr. Randall from the committee of enrolment, reported as duly enrolled, the bill entitled “an act to incorporate the Pontchartrain Rail Road Company;” and the said resolution hav-

ing been adopted, Messrs. Morgan of St. Tammany, and Leblanc, were appointed on said committee on the part of the Senate.—Ordered that the clerk request the concurrence of the house of representatives therein.

Mr. Derbigny, from the committee to whom had been referred the petition of Catherine Lacoste, reported thereon by introducing the following bill, entitled “an act to renew the pension of Catherine Lacoste, widow of J. B. Despouys,” which underwent its first reading—and second reading fixed for tomorrow.

Mr. Morgan of St. Tammany, asked and obtained leave to introduce the following bill, entitled “an act relative to the sale of surcloses and vacant estates,” which bill underwent its first reading—second reading thereof fixed for tomorrow.

Order of the day.

The bill entitled an act to provide a landing for the outer crafts of planters bringing vegetables to market in New-Orleans, was read a second and third time, and passed with its little, the Senate having disagreed with their rules.

Ordered, that the Secretary request the concurrence of the house of representatives to the said bill.

The bill entitled an act for the relief of Hubert Charnier, Joseph Dugat and Celestin Landry, was read a second time—and third reading thereof fixed for tomorrow.

On motion, a recess took place.

The Senate having resumed their sitting—on motion adjourned to tomorrow, 10 o’clock, A. M.

Now-Year, Jan 16.

Among the passengers in the Virginia from Vera-Cruz; are Colonel José Maria Tornel, Minister Plenipotentiary from Mexico to the government of the United States; and Col. Mejia, Secretary of Legation, with their families. Mr. Poinsot, expected in this vessel, has not arrived. Juan Fernández, of the Mexican army, died on board the Virginia on the 30th ultimo,

New-York, Jan 16.

From Cartagena.—By the arrival at Charleston of the schr. Fortune, Capt. Armstrong, in 23 days from Cartagena, we learn that Gen. Harrison, and Col. Torreal, Mexican, Charge d’Affairs to Colombia, were there, waiting a conveyance for the United States. The Colombian Convention was to begin its deliberations in January. Bolívar was expected in Bogota about 15th December—it was proposed to establish a Monarchy in that country, but Venezuela had declared its opposition to such a system, and would separate from the rest of Colombia in that event; this resolution of Venezuela, would probably alter the plans of the friends of Monarchy.

Paper.—A Treaty between Colombia and Peru had been signed and ratified.

The U. S. Ship Natchez had been expected more than a month at Cartagena, to convey Gen. Harrison to the U. S.
