El navío II. 100 de 74 cañones, que acaba de ser completamente armado en el departamento del Dugay, cuya tripulación asciende a de 434 hombres y 284 de tripulación de guardia, debiendo zarpar para la Habana una nueva expedición, con destino ulterior.

El 11 de diciembre se celebró el casamiento de S. M. el Rey de España, el mismo dia, precisamente, que la reina hizo su entrada en la capital.

Noticias de la Coruña del 30 de noviembre dicen que deben embarcarse muy pronto, en este puerto, de 7 a 800 hombres para la expedición contra Méjico; se asegura que el marqués de las Amarillas será el que la manda.

LOUISIANA LEGISLATURE.
House of REPRESENTATIVES.

Wednesday, the 27th Jan. 1830.
Agreeably to notice previously given Mr. Dueros introduced a bill entitled "An act supplementary to the act relative to the manner of granting licenses to pedlars and hawkers."

The above bill was read for the first time, and, on motion, ordered to be referred to the committee of ways and means.

Mr. Gainié gave notice that he would shortly introduce the bills entitled:

"An act supplementary to the different acts to incorporate the town of New-Orleans." And—

"An act relative to the Legion of Louisiana."

Thursday, 28th Jan. 1830.

On motion, the bill entitled, "an act, to amend the second section of an act entitled, 'an act supplementary to an act for the punishment of crimes, and misdemeanors, and others supplementary acts, approved, March 20th, 1818," was read for the first time, and was taken into consideration, section by section.

On motion, ordered that said bill be referred to the judiciary committee.

CONGRESS. SENATE.

Thursday, January 21.

Mr. Frelinghuysen submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Secretary of War be requested to furnish to the Senate any information in the possession of his department respecting the progress of civilization for the last eight years among the Cherokee, Creek, and Choctaw Nations of Indians. East of the Mississippi, and the present state of education, civil government, agriculture and the mechanic arts, among those nations.

The following resolution offered by Mr. Foot, as following was then taken up:

Resolved, That the Committee on the Public lands be instructed to inquire into the expediency of limiting to a certain period the sales of public lands to such lands only as have heretofore been offered for sale, and are subject to entry at the minimum price.

And also whether the office of Surveyor General may not be abolished without detriment to the public interest.

The question being on its indefinite postponement, Mr. Webster suggested that he should be unavoidable absent during the remainder of the Session of to-días, but he should make no motion to effect the postponement.

The Morning Herald, of the 18th, contains a letter from Paris, from which the annexed is an extract.—Instead of relaxing in their proceedings, Ministers begin to display energy. The prosecutions of Journalists increase. The provincial Press is now pursued with as much activity as was that of Paris, until repeated convictions taught the metropolitan Editors the necessity for prudence. All these circumstances, proving the determination of the Ministry to brave the coming storm, have at length convinced the Opposition that it is full time that they should be reorganized, and arrange their plan for the ensuing campaign. The Liberal Deputies are accordingly hastening to the capital, and very soon will it be known what prospect they have of success in their proposed effort to dislodge the Ministers. No defections, no ratings, from the ranks of the Linéaires, have been yet announced; but Pierre Polignac must have made his calculation here this, and reckoned on a majority also, or he would have taken to ensure one that would long since have transpired. Among the proofs of the resolution of Ministers to remain in office,

have alluded to the persecution of the Press. A day or two since, it was reported that mildness and forbearance would be substituted for the rancour an inveterate, with which the Liberal Journals have been attacked. It was even said the appeal of Mr. Chatelet, one of the responsible editors of the Courier Français, and one of the ablest of the Opposition writers, would be allowed to succeed; but either the report was unfounded, or Ministers have had a new access of provocation, for the appeal of M. Chatelet will, when called on to-morrow, be resisted, and his sentence of fine and three months' imprisonment affirmed. The reason for additional activity in prosecuting all offenses of a seditious tendency is to be found in the increase of that species of crime. By activity and vigour the police have banished from the stalls of the Paris Venders the effigies of the Duke of Reichstadt, which every where, and composed of every description of materials, met the eye. A new mode of reviving the recollection of the Emperor has, in the provinces, been resorted to, as you will have observed in the Newspapers. At one place, an old soldier, dressed in "the gray surtout and small cocked hat of the Emperor," incurred the vengeance of the law. In another, a wretched player, on the stage, not only assumed the same costume, in his character of a general officer, but had also the hardihood to "ape" the walk and gestures of the Mar. of St. Helena—kept his hands behind his back while marching, except when he uncloaked in order to thrust one of them into his waistcoat pocket, "in the manner of the Emperor," and drew thence a huge pinch of snuff. The actor was applauded to the echo.
