COLECCIONES DE LA PARTE DEL V.

Antes de ayer se presentó en la junta de ministros el gran proceso verbal, exigido los individuos que se declararon impunitados en segunda instancia, comprendido en las listas de maestros y comensales. La mayoridad de los imputados es decir el de hacienda Bajalgaros, el de marina Salazar, y el de estado Salmon fueron de parecer que la simple circunstancia de estar inscriptos en dichas listas, que no tienen ningún carácter de legalidad no debía oponerse su a la purificación de los procesados ni a la admisión en sus empleos respectivos, y que esto debía excluirse a los que hayan llevado actos en calidad de maestros y comensales, ó los que confiesen perjudicar a dichas reuniones.

Edicto supremo de la guerra es la única corporación que ha combatido y combatirá las iniquidades de los tribunales ardorosos y de los ministros de guerra y gracia y justicia, que formaron este monstruoso e inicuo procedimiento, apoyando con todas las razones que la ignorancia y el talento pueden sugerir a la equidad.

Hace tres días que el corregidor D. Fausto Ignacio Gutiérrez se introdujo de noche en casa de Pepa la Blanquita, (cuando con su capitán de caballería) de cuya sorprendida señora en un robo al lado de su querido el duque del Alba, se dirigió a ella preguntándole si sabía y la notificó la orden para que se hiciese diligencia con destino a Valencia, pero que por razón de ser ya tarde la permitió dirigirse hasta el otro día por la mañana. El duque preguntó al corregidor si le conocía, este respondió que sí pero que él tenía que hacer con S. M. y que así podía rotar cuando quisiera; que era sospechoso de la diligencia a dirigir sus gracias para guardarse a vista hasta Valencia del ejercito que debía considerarse en su nuevo destino. Se dice que en este momento asesinó el Sr. — que aquí encubriéronse por el abominio que cuando fue nombrado regente en el año de 1823.

S. M. ha dado honores y cortes de acuerdo a la exigencia del Sr. Vicente Madrid, de la reyna. Este acontecimiento tan tenso para sí mismo ha puesto en movimiento a todas las señoras de palacio, que se creen deshonradas alternando en el vestido con una pleya. Esta gira en el día de todo el favor de S. M.

Volvemos a aquellos tiempos felices en que no estaban más celebres economistas y hasta los tribunales ordinarios defiamaban contra los arrendamientos. El 9 del corriente se firmó el arrendamiento de los derechos de puertas y de consumaciones en todo el reino, en D. Felipe Riera y compañía. Se ha tomado por base el producto común de los cinco años últimos, con austeridad de nueve millones de reales a cargo de la compañía; red aquí las principales condiciones del contrato. El pago se hará por cuadernas partes y con anticipación; el arrendador no podrá aumentar los derechos ni destituir a los empleados amigos de dejar las tres terceras partes de su sueldo hasta su colocación en otro destino, pero las podrá mandar a un punto a otro en el privado provincia donde sirven. La conclusión de este contrato ha excitado rumores, particulares y extraordinarios, porque se acuerdan de ahora hacía dos años que un francés hizo la misma proposición y fue desechada, aunque la verdad no se conoce más que a la villa de Madrid. Despues varios proyectos y proposiciones de la misma especie han sido despreciados y a poco tiempo accordados a otra compañía que se ha considerado relacionado con ciertos personajes, que a la verdad debieran abstenerse cuidadosamente de todas estas especulaciones. De este número con los seguros militares la compra de tabacos, la carena de los barcos de guerra, y otras entradas no menos lucrativas:

Washington April 26.

In the Senate on Saturday a bill was reported, from the Committee on Roads and Canals, to authorize a subscription of stock to the Delaware and Raritan Canal Company. The bill for the removal of the Indians was again taken up, and Mrs. White of Tennessee addressed the Senate in continuation of the speech he commenced on Friday.

The House of Representatives were engaged throughout the day on the case of Judge Peck. The resolution moved by Mr. Buchanan, to impeach Judge Peck, was reported to the House without amendment, and concurred in by a vote of 123 to 49. A committee was then ordered to inform the Senate, and also a Committee of Impeachment.

The Baltimore Patriot says—

A writer in the United States Gazette confidently asserts that as soon as Congress shall rise, Mr. McLane is to be recalled from the Court of London, and Mr. Ingham sent as ambassador in his place, to the office of Secretary of the Treasury to be conferred on Mr. M. Lane. These arrangements are to be made, as the writer alleges, with a view of getting rid of Mr. Ingham as Secretary of the Treasury. His continuance in that Department is said not to be quite satisfactory to the "Supreme Magistrate" as well as on account of certain passages connected with his appointment, as of his official blunders, devotedness to the Vice President.

From the National Intelligence.

It has been mentioned, as matter of reproach, that on more than one occasion, recently, the House of Representatives has been obliged to adjourn, from the want of a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum. It is a circumstance, however, at which no one will be surprised, who has had any experience of the wea-

risome endurance, rather than labor, of South American Independence, and of the Greeks, the prominent spot he occupies on every leaf of American enterprise, whilst being reminded of Plutarch's statesmen and heroes. It is vain to strive to put down, and to keep down such men. The Deity never created them to be trampled over by mere gods without a particle of importation about them.—While here only Henry Clay, the eyes of the whole nation are turned upon him. He is thought more of, talked of, than all the butterflies that are now fluttering about the Capitol. He does not stir from home without meeting with the admiring and the patriotic tribute of thousands. His late visit to New Orleans; the crowds who flocked on the banks of the Mississippi to get a sight of him; the triumphant entertainments given him; the warm hearty generous enthusiasm of those who know him; all demonstrate the depth of that regard which the American people entertain for him.

The Encyclopedia Americana, now in the course of publication by Messrs. Carey, Lea & Carey, of Philadelphia, is thus spoken of in the London Literary Gazette:

This is the beginning of an important and valuable undertaking, and such as, if skilfully and industriously conducted to an end, of which the volume before us gives fair promise, is likely to add much to the credit of American literature. A popular dictionary, founded on the German Conversations Lexicon, and consequently embracing all the latest knowledge of Europe, and containing also a copious collection of original articles in American biography, and other American topics, must recommend itself to notice and favor. It is a curious circumstance, that in order to make room for such valuable matter, the editor has altogether omitted heraldry, as a subject of no consequence in the history of so new a nation as the U. S. this is further characteristic. We have also been amused with some of the references, such as "Acts of Faith, see Inquisition," "Actors, see Actors," &c. The volume concludes with the letter A to the word "poetry," and is, altogether, a well-executed design, and replete with information judiciously compressed. Such biographical sketches as it contains (Joel Barlow, for example,) are well done, and add much to the value of the work for English readers.
