Tuesday Evening, September 30, 1830.

On the night before last, about 12 o'clock, a vessel, we know not what, had found her anchor, laying opposite the city, or the mouth of the river. The conflagration has been so violent that it is thought that it is the ship, *Le Commerce du Commerce*, which has been captured by the *Royalists*. The ship, however, was not extinguished on board, but the crew were all safe, and her hull burnt over yesterday at 12 o'clock. The master of her had only cargo on board, and the freight was for sale, and the price was not known for a long time contemplated. The account has been maliciously set up, for no other reason than that he was on board the *Koln*.

This unfortunate man lived on the other side of the river, facing himself badly, sick on his bed, which lay near the Ferry Landing under a tree, where he expired at the end of his life. A strong and laudable heart, though the dead body was left lying in the water place, will be laid to rest at 10 o'clock in the morning, the next day at 10 o'clock in the morning. We must account for so revolting a sight of man.

A letter from Philadelphia, September 25, informs us that the news of the revolution in France had reached America, general alarm, accompanied by the march of New York, wishing to be in France as soon as possible, would not wait for the packet that would sail on the 15th for Marseilles, but freighted a steamer and immediately set to sea.

The great importance of the late political news, and the length of time that we have kept in suspense, have given us much news, from our columns, we have published, from our reading in the *Morning Courier* & *Evening Post* of New York, by which we see nothing ill reported. Never did Major Nagle, the editor of the paper, speak with more frankness than he did in his article, the Major, who lives in New York, believes as to be better acquainted than we are with what happens in our city. Indeed, no one can be more ready to be a good man, but not so far, than he is. We well remember that we were the first to announce that the yellow fever had made its appearance in New Orleans, it is the paper that is taking such notice that has led him to believe that Major Nagle had his eyes on the news, when he sent his latest version, the news, and wrote that he had from the best authority (Major) that the news published by the *Post*, of New Orleans, was false and groundless; this was repeated and supported by some sentences of his own which he availed upon us, making quite clear that he belonged to the *French* party, two negroes, by whom the funds were found in the room, and carried took place of safety. — *Fredericksburg Advertiser*.

As to the inhabitants of our city, they are not further prodded to believe that our assurance was founded, and that the Major must have lost his money, this has been confirmed by the event, and the credulous editor of the *Courier* and *Advertiser* has long been convinced of it; — therefore who is the man who wishes to denounce the publisher and who is the ignorant man who blindly believes every foolish report made to him? The Major editor: — Therefore all the foolish epithets he gives us must fall back upon himself, and curb his conceited mind; to this we must add but a small reflection, that is, after the editor of the *Courier* & *Advertiser*, he is often unmaskled in his lies, he ought to think of amending, and not giving in so many instances his opinion as a fact.

The following merited tribute to our distinguished Senator in Congress, we have been permitted to copy from a letter, written by a gentleman now absent from the state, to a highly respectable merchant of this City. — In the justness and truth of his remarks, we fully concur, and we think the friends of their application will be gratified by every one, who has the happiness of knowing the gentleman to whom they relate.

I recently enjoyed an opportunity of becoming personally acquainted with one of our friends in Congress, — the Hon. J. S. Johnston. You know the opinion previously entertained of him, very highly favorable, though wholly derived from his general reputation, and some knowledge of his acts and doings in the public service.

He was generally surprised or disappointed, as was to be expected, but it is especially so, in regard to persons of whom we have already been acquainted to think highly, and whom we have acquired without having seen them. Such was the impression I realized in making the acquaintance of Mr. Johnston. I knew him to be a man of talents, an able lawyer, and an upright gentleman who came passenger in the ship *Louisiana*, from New Orleans, at New York, and who arrived here on Saturday last in the steam boat from Baltimore, informing that on the 17th August (during the severe gale) about 20 miles from Cape Henry, there were two vessels a short distance from them, one of which was a pilot boat, the other a sloop — the former was captured, and after the gale had abated they passed her bottom upwards.

The pilot boat, Fourth of July, of Radnor, belonging to Mr. George Moseley, of that place, has not been heard from since the gale of the 17th ult. — The pilot boat Virginia was in company with her on that day and lost her foremast — serious apprehensions are felt for safety.

The above vessel may possibly have been the Fourth of July, Mr. Lane, and 4 or 5 others were on board. — *Voyage to Boston*.

From the N. Y. Mercantile Advertiser, September 7.

FROM CARTHAGENA. — The ship *Pamela*, arrived last evening, sailed from Cartagena on the 2d. He states that Bolivar remained in Cartagena; where an attempt had been made to assassinate him, and several of the inhabitants implicated in this design had been arrested. The country was in a very disturbed state.

A proclamation of Gen. Flores, dated Quito, May 31st, declares the south of Columbia an independent government. He of course is at the head of it. — "History," will convey to the most ages the truth of the sentiment. — The south was the last of the Colombian people to yield to the force of circumstances, and the first in raising monuments to the glory of Bolivar, the father and founder of three nations. — *Goya*, *Cuenca*, San Francisco de Quito, and various other places, have celebrated Actas in favor of the separation. The Departments intended to constitute the new government, are Ecuador, Chiquitos, & Asuncion. The Government at Bogota, under date of 2d of June, addressed a communication to Gen. Flores, in the hope of persuading him, and the people of the south, to abandon a project so ruinous to the best interests of the nation.

COLUMBIAN. — New York, Sept. 8.

Favourable news, and we have rather lower prices to day. New York is offered at \$51, and rather less would be taken. Troy has been sold at \$51 and Southern would not command more, though we have no sales as authority. Common brands of Western are now over \$51. There have been some sales of good Maryland Wheat at \$51 but most of the lots are storing, as they do not make them out to be obtained, and the owners are not willing to make a sacrifice, believing that the shanks are almost all in favor of an advance. There has been very little done in Cotton, though prices are fully maintained. The same is true of Coffee, Rice, and some other articles, for which there is a good demand, but a small stock to admit of much business.
