LIVERPOOL, august 14. Expedition against Spain. Towards the end of last week information was received that a vessel lying in the river, and laden partly with artillery, called the Mary, with a red streak, was on the eve of salling with an expeditionary force against the Spanish Government, on which Lieutenant Simpson, of the Swallow preventive cutton went in pursuit, and near Blackwall Reach, succeeded in boarding her, when he discovered a large stock of fire-arms. with custasses, swords, and about 2,000 rounds of ball cartridge. Each person on board (68 in number) was required to eign his name at length; and the same demand was made of a waterman named Webber, who, in going down the river after the vessel was captured by the Swallow, discovered a brown paper parcel floating on the water, supposed to have been thrown overboard anisrds when pursued, with a nineader shot attached to it, for the purpose of sinpresenter shot attached to it, for the purp se of sin-leing it, and containing two thousand circulars in the Spanish language, to be distributed among the Constitutional troops, and printed by Mr. Taylor, of Coleman street During the night, which the Spaniards spent in singing and shouting for the Constitutional cause, a party of the proventive service men from Woolwich were on guard on board the Spanish vessel. - Chronicle.

Another Secret Expedition .- There is much expeculation affost in the city relative to a secret expedition which has left this country, under the mes of about 150 emigrant Spanish officers, and which is believed to be directed against some part of the coast of Spain. It is known to have superintendence of Johnson, the well-known munggler, and though managed with much secrecy, has not escaped the notice of the Spanish Government, which is said to have made representutions on the subject to the Foreign Office, through its Ambassador in this country. Lord Aberdeen, in all probability, received the first intimation of what was going on from that quarter; but, even if disposed to interfere, it was too late, the expedition having actually sailed. That the officers engaged in it are sure of co-operation in that querter against which it is destined appears evident, from the smallness of its number, and from is carrying a very large supply of arms and attraumition.—Times.

TURKEY.—The German papers contain accounts from Constantinople to the 10th of July. which state that a meeting of the represent of all the Great Powers took place on the 27th of June, in the presence of the Capitan Pacha. The subject of their conference is said to have been the rights of the Porte over the Barbary States, which the Porte is exceedingly anxious should not be compromised by the success of the French expedition, but that, in the event of the expulsion of the Dey, the supreme authority, which it has always claimed over Algiers, should still remain vested in itself.—Mustapha Pacha is said to have obtained some decisive advantages over the Albanian insurgents, and a body of 5000 men has been sent to join the Grand Vizier's army. The Scraskier has 25,000 men at Philippopoli; but the reinforcements which are continually marching towards him prove that the insurrection is still strong and obstinate. The Pacha of Scutari has been outlawed for a proclamation which he issued in favour of the surgents, and the Commander of the castles on the Bosphorus has been sent to serve as a common sailor on board the fleet for assisting in promulgating it. The Russians dismantled the fortifications of Varus, and filled up part of the harbour before they evacuated it.


