REMOVAL OF M. DE POLIGNAC. Some particulars having been published se newspapers respecting the removal of the hree Ministers, Peyroquet, Chantelauze, and lucrnon de Ranville, we now give the letals respecting that of Mr. de Polignae. Mr. de Aid-de-Camp of General Lafayette and M. Rone, Aid-de-Camp of the Minister of War, arrived at St. Lo during the night between the 25th and 26th. After having assenbled the Municipality, and communicated their powers to them, they made the Ex-Minister get nto a post chaise, which carried them back t l'aris within 22 hours. Mr. de Polignac, seeing the precaution with which his removal was effec ed, expressed some fears respecting the danger hat might attend his journey. "We are chirthat might attend his journey. "We are charged with the care of your person, the danger is therefore, common to us all now, said the companions. 51. de Polignac spoke little on the road; his thoughts were only given in exclamations. Mention was made of some letters, which are introduced in the prosecution, respecting the burnings in the department of Calvados. These letters, in which the name of the Ex-Minister these crimes are to be stiributed. M. de gnae uncessingly accessed the guilty, adding that he could not comprehend the whole matter, and hat he was ignorant of the extremities his phrty had driven him into.
