It appears that one James Loper, in 1668 peritioned Sir Edmund Andros, then governor of New-England, to men in this country." It is not probable that his petition for a monopoly was granted, since authority of his town to pursue his avocation from this place.

We annex an extract from the old town records, vol. 1, page 30, showing the agreement hade with Loper and have been careful to preserve the spelling as we find it, although differing in many particulars from the orthography of good English writers at that time.
