WASHINGTON, Dec. 24. Gentlemen .- The Senate were employed to day in the examination of Mr. Lawless, at whose instance the impeachment of Judge Peck took place, and who is, I presume, the principal witness relied on by the managers to sustain the impeachment. He uppears to be a very intelli-gent man, and, as I understand, is an accomplished scholar and linguist. He delivers his testimony with great calmness and precision. Browbeating (I nee the term with strong qualifi cation, as the counsel for the Judge seem to conduct the case with great decorum) produces no effect on his evidence, or his manner of giving it. beyond that of communicating for a moment, emphasis to his tone and sternness to his glance. Yesterday, he seemed to hold all the ingenuity of his opponents at bay, and maintained his selfpossesion excellently. To day, the questions of the counsel of Judge Peck, are somewhat too direct in their language and their bearing, to permit much scope for ingenuity. They ask for facts, and he appears willing only to give them references, which, however strong in a court of reason, may not be deemed proof before a legal tribunal. Judge Peck attends very closely to every part of the proceedings, and readily takes it on himself to aid his counsel whenever, in his discretion, he considers it important to himself. He appears to have a very clear and analytic mind, and his manner of expressing himself is lucid and forcible. His voice is musical and distinct, and he has much felicity in disentangling points which bear on his case from the perplexity in which It is sometimes attempted by those who are laboring to convict him, to involve tiem. If I were sure of my own skill in playsiog somy, I would unhesitatingly pronounce him to be a hater, rather than a perpetrator of tyrany. His demeanor, countenance and tone, strongly prepossess those about him in his favor; and perhaps it may be ascribable to the prepossession, as much as to any knowledge of the merit of the case, that the general opinion seems in favor of his acquittal. There is, to be sure. some weight to be attached to the circumstances that there are about eighty hard cases hanging on the result of this impeachment, and that the conviction of the Judge would have the effect of creating an excitement in the State of Missouri of the most novel and dangerous character .--What I have said as to the prepossessing qualifications of judge Peck, may be received without prejudice to those of Mr. Lawless. He is well qualified to win esteem, as much from his per sonal as his mental accomplishments. But be lieving that he has been dealt with injustice, or a crucity which the law never contemplated and cannot countenance, his feelings may have run a vay with his discretion, and hence he may have been hurried into the course which he has now pursued, and which he must now continue to the end.

"July 21, 1814. Act signed by the Secretary of State of his Royal Highness the Prince of ier, from Richmond, with 4,200 bbls. flour, brig

"2. There shall be no alterations in the articles of that Constitution, which secure to all forms of religion equal protection and favor, and which guarantee the admission of every citizen. whatever be his religious creed, to public offices, and employments.

"3. The Helgic provinces shall be suitably represented in the Assembly of the States General, of which the ordinary sessions shall be held in turns of peace alternately in a town of Holland and in a town of Belgium.

" 4. As all the inhabitants of the Netherlands will be thus constitutionally assimilated to each, other, the different provinces shall equally enjoy all the commercial and other advantages which their respective situations require without any restriction being imposed upon one of them for

. 5. Immediately after the Union, the Provinces and town of Belgium shall be admitted to the commerce and navigation of the colonies upon the same footing as the provinces and towns of Holland.

"6. The burdens of the two countries, as well as the advantages, shall be common. The debts contracted up to the time of the Union shall be paid but of the general exchaquer of the Netherlands.

"7. Conformably to the same principles, the expenditure necessary for the establishment and preservation of the fortifications on the frontiers of the New State shall be defrayed by the generul exchequer, as it is the result of an object interesting to the safety and independence of all

the provinces and the whole pation.

"S. The expense of establishing and repairing the dikes shall be supplied by the distric's which are most directly interested in that part of he public services reserving the obligation of the Nation in general to furnish assistance in case of extraordinary disasters. The tax to be raised is the same mode as is now used in Holland. " These eight Articles have been guaranteed by Prussia, Austria, Russia, and England.
