From the A. D. Advertiser [The author of the following letter is a full blooded Indian.]

Washington City, Feb. 6, 1831. Mr. Elliott Cresson .- My friend; Permit me to address you as such, in which character I view all the humane and benevolent who exercise sympathetic feelings for the Indians under their trials and sufferings. Far was it from the expectation of Washington and Penn, when they entered into treaties of peace with our ancestors, that we, their descendants should so soon feel the inconveniencesof violated faith, which they and other great men assured them should endure forever. Even now, do we believe that if partisan newspapers and leaders, and aspiring politicians, did throw clouds and darkness upon our rights, that Justice would be continued to our race by the people of the United States. It was with surprise and as unexpected to me as the noise of thunder in a cloudless sky, that I read the remarks of Judge Wilkins of Pittsburgh, calculated to tarrish the fair fame of William Penn, whose kindness, honor, integrity and justice is above all price, and cher ished in the remembrance of even the South Western Indians. It is true that the good people of Pennsylvania hold their tenueres of land, forced from the "bleeding and weeping Indians, who, like the wounded deer, driven off by hunters from their standing forests and running wa ters, have languished away their doleful existence in the remote regions of the West? Where is the monument of the injustice of that man recorded! It is not in the heart of an Indian! Did he ever compel Indians to be amenable to Pennsylvania laws, and at the same time denied them the right of evidence in her courts? If laws were pased by him, they were not to oppress but to protect. Sir, we have nothing to do with the party warfare which rages in these United States. But politicians should not in this enlightened age, seek the examples of cruelty practised by some of the colonists, under British and Spanish influence, to justify their fa

tribes of indians who were his immediate neigh bours. If the plea of State necessity, in thus exercising oppression, to effect the removal of the children of the forest, (as they have been kindly termed.) be permitted to obtain, and to disregard treaties, trample on the dignity of the Supreme Court, and set at defiance the Constitutional acts of the majority; they must not "lay the flattering unction to their souls" that its disorganizing tendency will cease at the point of the extinguishment of Indian rights. It will extend far, and cut the vitals of these United It is a twin brother to nullification, which has reared its head, and spoke the discordant sentiments of disunion in South Carolina. May I then, feeble as must be the voice of an Indian, raise it on this occasion, and call the attention of your people to the dangerous rock of State necessity.-We are all entitled to law, and receive it as the boon guaranteed to us, by the great men who established the government, which declares that all men are by nature equa', and possess certain unalienable rights-the pursuit of happiness, and the enjoyment of liberty and life. This is what is right, and demanded by the Cherokee Nation, whose rights are by treasy engrafted into the constitution of the Uni ted states. They have yet a little spot of earth given them by the great King of kings, on which they desise to repose, and raise their children. For the love of righteousness and charity, let them enjoy it without molestation.

What have they done that they are out awed from the favor of the Executive of the General Government? They have learned to read the word of God, and to worship him in spirit and They have only practiced the lessons of Washington and other great men, the illustrious predecessors of the present Chief Magistrate of the United States. Then what is their offence! No-my dear friends, the people of Pennsylvania! to you I call for help to save my nation from destruction. You have done much, for which we hope to be grateful—but preserve us still in your generous sympathy—let us live and enjoy the blessings of civilization and religion on the land of your fathers Yours, respect-fully, JOHN RINGE. We have received from our attentive correspondent at Rio Janeiro, a paper of that city, containing the following:

Circumstantial account of the loss of the The-Vis .- The Thetis frigate (46 guns) sailed from this port for England, on Thursday, 3d inst. and on Sunday the 5th she struck on the rocks of Cape Frio, at about 20 minutes past 8 P. M. The night was very dark an I stormy, and the vessel steering N. E. by E. with fore-top-mast studding sail set, going bout 8 knots, when a general consternation was caused by the cry of dand ahead!" "hard up!" hands shorten sails!" which was instantly followed by a dreadful crash; the bowsprit was broken off short 14 feet from the stem, and hung over the larboard bow by the fore stay, and served as a fender to keep her bows from the rocks, and prevent them being stove in; guns were fired, which were distinctly heard by the inhabitants of Cape Frio; the foremast fell almost immediately after, also the mainmast, bringing the mizen mast with it, killing the man at the wheel, and one near the mizen mast, wounded the second master, besides a seaman and marine; the masts having fallen fore and aft, and the yards athwart the ship. The ship's head now went off, throwing her quarter on the rock, when about 60 men effected their escape; the larboard anchor was let go, and a small sail

hoisted on the stump of the fore and main mast, to lay her off from the rocks, and blue lights were ournt. It was at length ascertained that the vessel had entered a small bay with a high rock immediately over head; the helm was tended in the gun-room till the rudder went; chain pumps were rigged but she made no water; the ship then swung with her larboard bow on the rock, and the hawser and ropes were got on shore but as there was no small rock to take a turn round. the men could not hold on; a considerable number however made their escape; -about midnight the ship went off to the distance of her own length and sunk stern foremost; after some de lay, a rope was got ashore, and the remainder of the crew were slung in a bowline knot and dragged through the surf. The Captain remained on the wreck till quite exhausted, and it was near day-light when he came on shore. A per pendicular rock of nearly 20 feet in height was now to be surmounted, and then a steep hill, covered with loose earth and prickly plants, which shirts and trowsers, and many without shoes. and had suffered much from fat gue and exhaustion, Another hill was still to be ascended be fore a view of the main land could be obtained.
