Sample marked No. 1 was made from a material of very inferior quality: No. 2 was manufactured from molasses alone: No. 3 was made from sour canes, of the worse imaginable description: No. 4 was produced from cane juice alone, 760 gallons of which, yielded 1251 lbs gros, of sugar 951 lbs of dry sugar, and finally 708 lbs. of almost all white sugar, after eleven days draining, whilst on the contrary on equal quantity of c ne juice manufactured according to the ordinary method, produced 996 lbs. only, gross, 671 lbs. of dry sugar, and finally, (after two clays,) and eleven days draining, it was reduced to 558 lbs. out of which only one third was white, the re-naining two thirds being brown dark sugar. It should be noticed that these operations have been performed under very great disadvantages, and inconveniences, such as inefficient apparatus, want of steam, &c; circumstances extremely unfavorable to the results. But notwithstandit g all that, in the clarification of the juice, only fifteen minutes were employed, and in the evaporation to reduce it to sugar, one hour and thirty minutes, the filtration taking 45 minutes—say the whole operation, two hours and a half; which time may be reduced to one hour an a half by employing an apparatus of convenient dimensions and a steam generator of sufficient power. ly ten days draining, From a variety of experiments, tried upon an equal quantity of juice, in order to use rion the relative results, working the one in the ordinary manner and the other by Mr. Archbald's process it was proved that the sugar produced by the latter, was at least 20 per cent, more than that yielded by the former, and which sugar was m mufactured in considerably less time and of a quality incomparably superior to what is commonly made. The marked advantage offered by Archbald's method, over all others, can only be explained by attributing it to the extreme purification of the juice, that is effected-the correcting the acidity-and cleansing it of all extraneous matter, by which sugar of the greatest purity is produced and the loss attendant on the old mode of skimming is avoided. These advantages were made obvious on weighing two moulds of sugar of equal capacity, the one made by Mr. Archbald's method and the other in the ordinary way & the former, besides being almost entirely white was found to weigh 44 lbs, while the latter weighed 34, one third only of which was white the other two thirds being brown and dark sugar. To these should be added another very considerable advantage; namely that or extracting a large portion of sugar of superior quality from molasses, which article is now, in some establishments absolutely thrown away in the suposition that it is of no use.
