CALIFORNI-CATROLIC MISSION. Upper Mexico, or new California, lies it is a present defined, between 32 deg. and 42. North atitude. The eastern limits I cannot accurately describe. It is calculated that the country contains 376,000 square miles. It is a pleasant and fruitful country, enjoying the most salubrious climate, and producing the necessaries and many of the luxuries of life. At Montherry I ate ex cellent pears of the second growth, the first fruit being ripe in March or April. The vine and olive may be successfully cultivated, also most of the tropical fruits. The hills are covered with horses and cattle, by means of which most of their commerce with foreign vessels is carried on. There is a deficiency of water, and this season of the year is afflicted with a severe drought Yet, from what I have seen and heard, I am persuaded that this might be made an exceed-

ingly fine country.

Of inhabitants there are about 5000 nominal whites-Most of them are "Creoles"-descen dants of the Spaniards and Indians.
