ESTADO DE TABASCO.

El vice gobernador en ejercicio, á los habitantes del estado, sabed: que el congreso ha decretado lo siguiente:

El congreso constitucional del estado libre de Tabasco ha tenido á bien decretar lo siguiente:

Art 1º. El gobierno dispondrá que todos los individuos que acudieron y fomentaron las desastrosas revoluciones que se han sucedido en el estado despues del diez y seis de diciembre en que se restableció el sistema federal, salgan fuera del territorio del estado.

2º. Los gefes de policia, y los ayuntamientos por conductos de éstos, informarán al gobierno de todas los individuos que haya en su departamento ó pueblos respectivos, que deban comprenderse en el artículo anterior, para que dicho gobierno les libere pasaporte, oyendo antes á su consejo; pudiendo hacer lo mismo por escitaiva ó informe de la misma corporacion.

3º. Los contenidos en el artículo 1º. no se exceptúan de la pena que pueda resultarles como delinquentes ó cómplices en delitos comunes.

4º. Son responsables los mismos individuos de las dilapidaciones y perjuicios que haya sufrido la tesoreria del estado, como igualmente de los que hubiesen inferido á las particulares.

5º. El tesoro general representará en fiscalia los derechos de la hacienda pública del estado, y los particulares podrán hacerlo igualmente ante los respectivos tribunales.

6º. El gobierno dispondrá que se pongan en administracion los bienes de los motes de las revoluciones que se hayan escapado del estado, para el efecto que queda indicado en el artículo anterior, siempre que no haya personas que representen por ellos.

7º. Los principales autores de las revoluciones que han causado tantos desastres, carecerán de toda proteccion legal siempre que regresen al territorio del estado.

Lo tendrá entendido el gobernador del estado y dispondrá su cumplimiento, haciéndolo imprimir, publicar y circular. Dado en la villa de Teapa á 11 de marzo de 1850.—Manuel Padma, presidente.—Manuel Zapata, diputado secretario.—Juan de la Rosa Perez Medina, diputado secretario.

Por tanto, mando á todos los habitantes del estado que cumplan, y á las autoridades que hagan cumplir la presente ley en todas sus partes, á cuyo efecto imprímase, publíquese y circúlese.—Teapa marzo 12 de 1850.—Juan Dionisio Marzin.—Manuel José Hernandez, secretario.

enter into a serious consideration of the Frenchman's question, si un Allemand peut servir de esprit. An editor whose main object is to make himself acceptable to those whom he thinks likely before long to get the upper hand; who sticks at nothing in his efforts to serve the party from whom he receives present pay or expects future reward, and laughs at all who pretends to principle; should certainly never be advanced by those that are either truly honest or wish their countrymen to think them so; if for no other reason, certainly for this, that they lose more than they gain by it. But for any member of the editorial corps, even if he thinks that nine tenths of those on whom the favours of a government are apt to fall, belong to the class just alluded to, to proscribe the whole fraternity, seems to us neither just nor political. The most slavish sycophant that ever took pen in hand could not possibly prostitute himself more shamelessly before the distributors of the leaves and fishes, than scores of our tavern and town meeting orators, whom the public have seen elevated, from time to time, to posts of honor or of profit, every man in the community knowing perfectly well how their advancement had been won. Yet it has never been suggested that, to keep these out, all busy politicians, whether honest or not, should be excluded. The mere talker, to be sure, has this advantage over the writer; that the former may safely deny what he swore to yesterday, while the inconsistent sentiments of the latter may be called into conflict with each other from every point of the compass.

The Colombia Telescope, speaking of the oppressions of the South and of the best means of relieving and redressing them, says:—

"We have no doubt but the truth and justice that serve as a basis to South Carolina principles, will in eight or ten years ensure them ample success. But in the mean time we are paying a tribute of 4 millions of dollars annually to enrich the Northern sections of the union, and to gratify the peaceable, and moderate men at home; the men who are too wise to be warm, and who bear with exemplary patience all the wrongs of South Carolina, because they constitute the rights of their Northern friends.

We are persuaded that no speedy cure for the evil will be found, except in a firm and determined resistance by declaring the Tariff of protection null and void in South Carolina; and by resolutely enforcing and at all hazards maintaining this declaration. Indeed, we see enough of public sentiment here to be satisfied, that no member of the Legislature will risk his character and standing in the state, by proposing any remedy short of this. We know the people: we know they will support this measure; and we know that a representative who refuses to do so, is not a representative of the opinions of South Carolina.

That there are among us many friends to Northern interests, who by a cry of disunion, and by preaching up moderation, will strive to paralyze the honest effort of the people's friends; but the time is at hand when this cunning policy will neither be wise or safe. We have borne too much already, to tolerate much longer the men who will aid in joining fraud to fraud, and robbery to robbery, and who under the mask of friends are our most decided and deadly enemies. Nothing but fear will induce the North and the friends of the North to act honestly. Let us at once (as we no doubt shall do) manfully resist these acts of abominable usurpation, and let them try to coerce us if they dare. Should they be weak enough to make the attempt all coalition between the South and the North is ended forever.

Nothing remains but for the people to be cautious whom they elect; and to elect no one who will not be true to the test of war against commercial restrictions, and the inviolability of state rights; resistance not stopping short in whatever way it may be necessary to answer perfect freedom to us and our posterity."

And a writer in the Elgfield Carolinian still more emphatically.

"How long are we to bear it? Let our members of Congress, if they feel disposed to act the part of patriots, resign their seats, and go into our own legislature, resolved to carry their State triumphantly through a noble contest, and place her where she has a right to be, on high grounds of constitutional freedom. It is all idle to talk about the matter longer. Let them come and act. Many of them have just weight and influence throughout the Union, and by such conduct would show that they were sincere. They would carry with them a character and influence, which would produce a moral effect throughout the country, that nothing could control. It would produce unanimity and strength at home, and power abroad.

led, must give us redress. It is a disgrace to have our representatives in Congress, with no power. Without power, they must feel their neglect, and finally will bring down upon themselves and us, contempt. And it is weak to suppose that they can obtain power there by speaking and voting. Already have they been treated with such contempt, as not to be allowed to speak on what is of the deepest concern to us. Let them come home then, and go into our Legislature, there to put the state on her sovereign and reserved powers, let the consequences be what they may.
