SPAIN.—Letters received in N. Y. by the Zamor, from Cadiz, give information of the sailing of the Spanish squadron on the 27th of March, for Cuba. There is no longer any doubt, remarks the N. Y. Daily Advertiser, that the reported expedition against Mexico has been postponed, at least for some months.

By the Schooner Josefina, arrived in this port, on Saturday, we are informed that the above troops arrived at Havana on the 20th ult. General Bellido came on board of the Ship-of-war Herse, with several Officers, Commodore Laborde departed on board of the frigate Real, which sailed in company with the Corveta. It is supposed that the Commodore is on a mission to Hayti.

Washington May 10. Reform.—The question raised by Mr. Holmes towards the close of his powerful speech on Removals, "What have you gained?" cannot be too deeply pondered on by the American People, and especially by that portion of them who have given credit to the promises of reform which the party now in power was so lavish in making, while it was struggling to obtain it.

The fate of the noble plans for reforming the Judiciary, the Bank of the United States, the Attorney General's Department, &c. &c. was adverted to by Mr. Holmes in a manner but little calculated to reconcile the public mind to the boastful prophecies of an able Administration, which were loudly uttered by the adherents of the present Dynasty.

A young woman in Freehold, New Jersey, recently brought a suit against a man named David Williamson, for slander, in circulating reports in the highest degree injurious to her reputation. The charges were distinctly and clearly proved, and the jury gave a verdict of four thousand dollars.

The Postmaster General, instead of confessing the true cause of the application, has the hardihood to pretend that he wants the money for new post routes! Routes for which, if established, no money can be wanted till the expiration of nearly twelve months, and which, as designated, can, on no credible computation, require even a considerable portion of that amount!

Amsterdam papers to the 30th March inclusive have been received by the editors of the N. Y. Journal of Commerce.

A Frankfort date of the 26th mentions the receipt of a letter from St. Petersburg, which states the proposition of the Porte to satisfy the indemnity of Russia by a cession of the Principality of Wallachia to one of the great Powers, in consequence of which a cession would probably be made in Asia.

Accounts from Constantinople to March 2d, state that the late Reis Effendi (reformed out of office,) has been succeeded by Mahmed-Hamid Bey. Two persons have died of the plague in the Turkish capital.—Count Orloff, the Russian Ambassador, has received orders to remain there for the present.

Unless we get something shortly by the Mail, we cannot exactly divine what we shall do. There is a host of vessels due from the big Cities over the water, and we are lacking grievously in intelligence therefrom. The inventive stock of the Atlantic City seems entirely to have given out.

A French paper states that a Monsieur Maurice, a person 57 years old, and registrar of Teupenges, in the Department of Lower Seine, was found, on the 21st December last, lying asleep in the barn of a person named Basset, having at that time slept sixteen days. During the last four years, four similar accidents have befallen him.

Mr. John Randolph.—"Mr. Randolph," says a correspondent of the Enquirer, "attended the election, in this Country, although in an extremely debilitated condition of body. He delivered a long address to the people, in support of the adoption of the new Constitution. His speech was a very happy effort, full of touching eloquence and pathos, towards the close of which, he took occasion to observe, that, at that place, more than 30 years ago, he had made his first public speech, and that it was at the same place he was now delivering his last."

Cruel Superstition.—China is tolerably free from direct cruelty in her religious superstitions. At least she allows nothing as all that can compare with Hindoo Sutes, except her horrible infanticide, which, by the way, is induced, not by religious superstition, but by hard hearted scepticism, and the visionary dreams of political economy, which says the young stranger, has no right to the board of privileged fathers, and therefore must be gone. But China has her Anthropophagi—Medic; those who for medical purposes, feed on various parts of the human body. The murder of a young lad at Macao, three years ago, was occasioned by the misbelief that a portion of the human flesh would restore a dying man. And the executioner of ten thousand mentioned in the Canton Register exhibited for sale, the other day, the gall bladder of a man he had cut to pieces, in which grains of rice were steeped, to be eaten daily in specified numbers. On turning to the Penal Code, it appears that a man of this Hoangshan District, named New, was on a former occasion, brought to justice for procuring a portion of human gall at the price of one hundred and twenty Taels of silver. And about the year 1811, a man in Che Keang, named Chang, was convicted, who had in the course of sixteen years, caused the death of eleven young girls, that he might drink certain fluids to add vigor to his own constitution.—The twelfth victim to his cannibalism escaped to be a witness against him; and the "Man in form but brute in nature," as the official document characterizes the atrocious criminal, was put to death by a slow and dignified punishment. The wretch, when he died, was about seventy years of age.—Sixteen families who had suffered by his horrible propensity, were summoned to attend his execution by being cut to pieces.
