Splendid success of the Polish Russian Provinces—End of the commotions in Italy-Insurrection in Italy and in Turkey.

The Poles have gained a complete victory o ver the Russians. We give their official accounts. A few days prior to this engagement the Polish Commander in Chief had codeavortel to prevent the further effusion of blood, by an attempt at negociation with Diebitsch, but he required the unconditional su unission of all the Poles as a preliminary measure, and the demand was rejected with scorn. In addition, Lithuanin is in a state of insurrection. At Wilna the capital, the overthrow of the Russian authority is complete. The nobility have set free then slaves and supplied them with money and arms Distantsch is thus cut off from his supplies both of men and troops. ## PRUSSIA.

Letters from Mentz, of the 26th of March. state that the Prussian army, moving from Erfurt to the Belgie provinces, is composed, acording to authentic returns, of 120,000 men vell armed and disciplined. Upon the frontiers of Belgium there were at that date the 8th corps I the arm; the 7th were cantoned in the forsafe from French aggression.

BERLIN, April 1. Letters from Koningsberg say, that on the 28th ult. intelligence was received there from the Russian frontier, that an insurrection had broken out in the government of Wilna. According to these letters the insurgents, having obtained pos session of the fire arms of which they had same time been previously deprived, and which had been deposited at Roznyn, were advancing against Georgenburg, from which place a great number of inhabitants had fled to the Russian territory. On their way to Georgenburg the insurgents are said to have destroyed and plundered several small places in the government of Wilna, and to have repulsed several bodies of lessacks sent against them. From Tilsit we hear that the insurgents have already thrown themselves in the vicinity of Tanroggen.

Berlin, April 6.—Letters from Warsaw have

been received here by express, which centain the details of the very serious loss which the corps of General Geismar, has sustained by an attack from the Poles under Skrzynecki, exe cuted with equal boldness, and success on 31st March and 1st April: The Polish commanderin-chief was informed of the negligence of the Russian at Wawer and Groschow, in their contouments and camp. He led a corps of 25,000 men on the 30 ult. to Praga, and in the night of the 31st of March approached the Russian camp; the road was covered with straw, so that the artillery and cavalry advanced without being per c ived, to which the darkness of the night not a little contribute. The advanced guard of General Geismar, consisting of 8000 or 10,000 men, was first attacked, and almost wholly destroyed. The Poles took 4000 prisoners and sixteen pieces of canon. The latter or amented with green boughs, were brought into Warsaw. Skrzynecki followed up his victory, and feli upon the corps of General Rosea, who, with 20,000 men, was posted at Demberielki. He oo was obliged to yield to the imperious attack of the Poles-lost 2000 prisoners and 9 pieces of cannon. The Russians retired by way of Minsk, to join the main body of the army. > TURKEY. Accounts have been received from Constan tinople to the 2d of Feb. They state that the Turk is reforming all his institutions, and giving equal privileges to Mussulmans and Christians. An edict to this effect has been issued, so that the sound of reform is alreedy re-echoed from the shores of the Bosphorus! One letter says that an Algerine vessel, bearing the tri-colored

flag, had lately entered the harbor of Constan-tinople. The captain's charter, which was delivered to him at Algiers by the French Consul qualified as French subjects the captain and the rew, who were all Algerines, and of course, Musulmans. This occurrence caused a great sensation among the Turks, because it was the first visible demonstration to them of the conquest and possession of Algiers by the French.

By accounts received from Memel late yes-terday afternoon, to the 3d instant, in-formation of an important nature was obtained. The letters mention that at Polangen; about four ules from Memel an engagement had taken dace between the insurgents and the Russian troops, in which the latter were defeated. Polangen was in flames. In Volhyhia there was not less than 18,000 organized insurgents who ad risen in opposition to the Russian power. ITALY.
