ESTADISTICA DE PUERTO RICO.

Tomamos a la vista dos relaciones impresas de todas las obras publicas que se han emprendido y continuado en la isla de Puerto Rico en los años de 1817 y 1828.

La poblacion se compone de: 123 982 blancos, 77 328 negros, 15 339 negros, 33 806 esclavos, 24 418 esclavos.

Tropa veterana, presidio, hospital, 3,300

Total general 238,473

Nota. Los agragados son casi todos de la raza de blancos.

De esta masa de poblacion, 101,749 son labradores, 1,288 comerciantes y 3,622 artesanos.

De la misma masa de poblacion 235,143 son españoles, 2,191 extranjeros, y 9,669 africanos.

Hay en la isla 12,062 casas, 19,648 buehos, 1,120 trapiches de mader, 2,9 idem de hierro, 110 molinos de limpiar el café, 292 almibares, 31 hornos de cal, y 72 idem de ladrillos.

Los diversos ramos de cultivo ocupan una estension de 481 caballerias y 113 cuerdas de la forma siguiente:—10,456 cuerdas de caña, 25,261 idem de platanos, 12,321 idem de arroz, 12,072 idem de yuca, 428 de nenas, 612 de frijoles, 13 idem de haitia, 17,860 de café, 6 idem de 14,338 713 arboles de café, 158 cuerdas, 6 idem de 42,513 arboles de algodon.

Existen ademas 1,832 pimientos, 6 eran arboles de la pimienta de Tabasco, aguacates, naranja &c.

Los principales productos del suelo consisten en: 365,535 quintales de azúcar, 3,118 410 cuartillos de mielado, 3, 18 410 idem de rum, 5, 274 quintales de arroz, 37 777 fanegas de maiz, 15,257 quintales de tabaco, 12,464 idem de algodon &c.

En el ramo de crianza existen 34 383 vacas, 16,683 buehos, 8,131 novillos, 3,491 cabras, 15,266 caballos, 17,184 yeguas, 212 borros, 682 cerdos, 16 116 cerdos, 134,593 galinas, y 6,066 pavos.

Los productos en estos ramos ascienden a 23,129 terneros, 7,193 corderos, 8,344 cabritos, 11,989 porcos, 123 muleros, 68 pavos, 96,294 lechones, 806,902 pollos, y 3,220,358 huevos.

Los productos de las rentas en el año de 1828 fueron de 691 867 pesos, y en 1829 solo ascendiendo a 362,209.

Mobile June 26. Five Hundred Dollars Reward.—The following letter which we received from a highly respectable planter in the vicinity, details as dialy, an attempt upon the life of a following being, as we ever heard of. The parties to the atrocious act, it appears are not only not known, but not surmised, even by a correspondent. The reward offered for their discovery is large; but we hope the indignation of the people alone, will be sufficiently aroused to hunt out and bring to justice, the authors of this wicked and unprovoked design, to tak the life of a respected and useful fellow citizen.

Clark County, June 19, 1830. Co. Messrs: Last night while I was sitting in my room in company with a young gentleman, a traveller who remained here a few days to rest himself, four guns loaded with buck shot, were discharged at me. I sprung into the next room for my gun, in order to return the fire, and as I went through the passage, shot showered all around me. I cannot conceive how I escaped unhurt; the shot tore the facing of the door as I entered it, and one shot went through a glass which lay on a Bureau where I was standing loading my gun, and lodged in the partition of the house. The bed curtains in that room are also penetrated with several shot. As soon as I loaded my gun I went out to return the fire, but no fire, but no person appeared. The next morning I found three foot tracks, which I measured, which as near as I could take their measure in the sand, are of the following length: first 11 inches long, second 10 1-2 inches long, third 9 inches, all shoe or boot prints, I believe there was a fourth track; I could not find it plain enough to measure it correctly: but it was as near as I could judge from 9 1-2

to 10 inches—I also found the tracks of the horses they rode; they were left about two or three hundred yards from the house, and I traced their tracks from the house to where they were left. You will please insert this in your paper offering a reward of Five Hundred Dollars to any person or persons, who will give such information as will discover and convict the parties concerned in this vile act.
