

NUVA-ORLEANS.

El correo del Norte que llegó el jueves nos ha traído gacetas que contienen noticias de Europa de bastante importancia las de Inglaterra se leen el 1º de julio y las de París el 6 de junio.

El rey de España falleció el 26 de junio a las 3 y 1/2 de la mañana. El duque de Clarence se tomó las riendas del gobierno con el título de William IV. En Francia fueron electos 193 diputados el 23 de junio: de este número, 144 son liberales; 45 ministeriales los 4 restantes no son conocidos 100 de los diputados que dieron su voto por el discurso en contestación al del rey fueron reelectos.

FRANCIA.

El MESAGER del 28 de junio, publica una acción que hubo entre los Francesos y los Argelinos frente a Argel. La posición de los Francesos fué atacada por el enemigo con un número de 40,000 hombres, el 19 de julio; los franceses solo les opusieron 25,000 porque el resto del ejército estaba empleado en proteger el desembarque de los petrechos.

Los Argelinos atacaron con la mayor impetuosidad, y se dice que los cavallos de friza empleados por la infantería francesa fueron de mucha utilidad á estos para defenderse contra la caballería Árabe. La acción duró 6 horas, pero la disciplina europea logró la victoria. Se dice de la península que haya sufrido el ejercicio, se opina que ha sido considerable sobre todo entre los artilleros, el terreno era ventajoso para las tropas regulares. Los Argelinos tenían algunas piezas ligeras puestas sobre camellos de los que se servían con buen éxito. Cuando comenzaron á tomar retirada se introdujo el desorden en sus filas, habiéndose un campamento á su retaguardia donde se precipitaron con la mayor confusión; ellos fueron virvemente perseguidos por los franceses que se ampararon de ellos el mismo día.

El 20 hubo un segundo combate que fué tan glorioso como el primero y por momento se aguardaba una tercera acción. Este segundo combate se efectuó cerca de Bidi-Khalasi en el camino que va al Sultan-Khalasi, la fortaleza del emperador el número de los heridos según el parte de Mr. Bourmont, es de 300 hombres.

Las diestras continúan tambien un parte del almirante Duperré en que anuncia que el desembarque de los petrechos se ejecutaba con la mayor actividad. Se dice que la infantería árabe ha sufrido una pérdida considerable. La conducta de las tropas francesas ha sido digna del mayor elogio; ellos se ampararon de 8 cañones de bronce, 400, tiendas de campaña entre las cuales se hallan las del Agé de Argel y las de los beyes de constancia y de Fitriy que son de la mayor magnificencia; 100 Camayos y una gran cantidad de polvora y balas. 6,000 Arabes se pasaron á los franceses.

COMUNICADO.

NUVA-ORLEANS 21 de agosto.

En el mes de abril proximo pasado publicó un diario de esta ciudad un artículo relativo á la detención que sufrió en Veracruz el bergantin americano Morelos, manifestando la conducta arbitraria que habían tenido las autoridades y empleados de la república, y concluyó diciendo que semejantes excesos solo se ejecutaban en un país donde no había gobierno, y por consiguiente las autoridades y empleados obraban despoticamente. Como era asunto muy grave y que podría traer malas consecuencias al comercio, si es cierto lo que espresa dicho artículo, y siendo de urgente necesidad que el supremo gobierno tuviese conocimiento para que abrigase los hechos y procediese en justicia con arreglo á las leyes que rigen la república; el 17, de dicho abril, se remitió por conducto del ministro de relaciones el artículo original, para que tomase conocimiento de su contenido y acordase lo conveniente. El ministro de relaciones así que recibió la carta con el citado artículo, lo pasó al ministerio de guerra, á donde correspondía, para que le informara lo que había en el particular; y en contestación le dice el Sr. secretario del despacho de la guerra, lo que sigue. «E. Sr. impuesto este ministerio de la nota que se sirve acompañarme del artículo publicado en el diario de Nueva Orleans relativo á la detención que sufrió en Veracruz el bergantin americano Morelos, y que en su vista me pide V. E. las explicaciones necesarias para poder contestar á estos reclamos, responderé á V. E. que según consta en el expediente de la materia, que se halla en esta secretaria de mi cargo, el gobierno no ha tenido parte alguna en las supuestas violencias de que se quejan los interesados del buque. Este vino á Veracruz con objeto de sacar autorizada una patente de Corzo que le dió el Sr. Basadre de las que tenía de la anterior administración, á tiempo que se encontraron órdenes muy terminantes para recogerse, como en efecto se verificó, y con prevenciones para que no saliese del puerto sino era con las formalidades que prescriben las leyes del país y en que se comprenden los demás buques de comercio. Después de este hecho, se le capturó el referido buque en contrabando de polvos, en cuyo negocio conoció aquel juez de distrito; pero habiéndose sancionado como prevenido por este tribunal y aquella comandancia general sobre cual de las dos autoridades debía haber hecho este su maná, apelaron á la suprema corte de justicia, para su resolución, en cuyas salas se encuentra hoy día. Estas aclaraciones de que carece el comunicado en cuestion, y que solo presenta hechos aislados, servirán á V. E. para el objeto que desea, mas siq bastasen se pedirán mas amplias que la comandancia general de Veracruz, quien como tribunal que conoce en este asunto judicial, sin injerencia de esta secretaria, podrá acaso ampliarlas mas.—Y en traslado á V. en resulta de su carta N.º 442, de 17, de abril proximo pasado, para que con esta noticia procure rectificar la opinión sobre este asunto.—Dios y Libertad.—Mejico 1.º de junio de 1830.—A. El gobierno de Mejico jamás dejará de castigar las arbitrariedades de sus empleados, teniendo conocimiento de ellas; con datos antecedentes y detalles el publico imparcial podrá formar su juicio; y se convencerá que los que publican tales escritos son enemigos de la república. Jamás permitiré, como buen ciudadano, que se ultraje á mi gobierno injustamente; y lo defenderé con el lenguaje de la razón y con datos; estando dispuesto á contestar á todo lo que se escriba, siempre que se guarde por los autores de los escritos las leyes de la libertad de imprenta, y el respeto que el público se merece.

UN MEXICANO.

Méjico 21 de julio. La junta patriótica encargada de celebrar el aniversario del primer grito de independencia, tuvo su segunda sesión en la tarde de ayer. La comisión respectiva presentó el proyecto de las solemnidades que ha de haber en aquel día. A mas de la función de iglesia, diversiones en la alameda, fuegos artificiales y un circo cubierto en la plaza mayor con un templete en el centro, para que allí se diga la oración á medio día, y por la noche se ilumine y se coloquen músicas, fueron aprobadas las proposiciones sobre socorrer á niños pobres educandos, á viudas y huérfanos de los mejicanos que perecieron en Tampico militando contra los españoles, á los presos y tambien á las Capuchinas de esta ciudad, como propuso en el acto el Sr. Torres Guzman. El Sr. diputado Dominguez propuso que se socorriesen á los huérfanos mejicanos que han quedado en Nueva-Orleans por haber fallecido sus padres espules de la república. Apoyaron el pensamiento otros Sres.; pero discrepaban en cuanto á los términos en que se podía acordar lo conveniente, porque suponiéndose que la cantidad destinada á estos socorros no seria crecida, era necesario arreglar con meditación la parte que de ella podría aplicarse á dichos huérfanos. El Sr. Molinos hizo presente la atención que estos merecian á la junta, siendo un omejicanos espatriados sin culpa, y que habiendo perdido á sus padres, se hallaban sin recursos y en un país inhospitalario padeciendo la indigencia ó espuestos á todos los horrores de la miseria y á parecer de hambre, como lo ha sucedido á algunos, según acababa de decir uno de los Sres. que habían hablado sobre este asunto. Concluyó proponiendo, que para socorrer á estos desgraciados sin perjuicio de los otros pobres de esta ciudad, se abriese una suscripción entre los individuos de la junta que podía producir lo necesario para que aquellos huérfanos pudieran ser restituidos á su país. Se aprobó esta indicación por aclamación. Se nombró al Sr. Molinos para recibir las suscripciones que inmediatamente exhibieron varios individuos de la junta. Los demás hicieron la oferta que tuvieron á bien, asentándose todas por los Sres. secretarios, y resultando que la suscripción ascendió á mas de setecientos pesos, sin embargo de haber faltado á la sesión muchos individuos de la junta, sin duda por lo lluvioso de la tarde.

El Sr. Rodríguez promovió que el socorro se extendiese á las viudas que se hallaban en la pobreza. El Sr. Durán propuso que se auxiliasen tambien á los mejicanos que salieron de la república en clase de sirvientes de los espules, ó sus familias, y por haber perdido á sus amos se hallen sin recursos para volver á su patria. Se hizo advertir que la traslación de todas estas personas no debe ser hasta nuevos estos puertos, porque sería traerlos á perder por las enfermedades que riman en ellos, principalmente en la estación actual, sino hasta otros puntos de lo interior ó hasta esta capital.

Estas proposiciones merecieron la aprobación de la junta, y el acuerdo no quedó reducido á los mejicanos pobres que se hallan en Nueva-Orleans, sino á los que estuvieren en cualquier país extranjero, bien que se manifestó que aquellos deberían ser preferidos por ser mas fácil su regreso, y porque se sabe que las familias pobres se dirigieron á aquel punto, porque la escasez en que se hallaban les impedía ir á Europa. El Sr. Gomez Navarrete propuso, que una comisión de nueve individuos se encargase de llevar á efecto el acuerdo de la junta, dándole cuenta en todas las sesiones ordinarias de lo que adelantase. Se le probó esta proposición, menos en cuanto al número de individuos que se acordó fuere el de tres. Para este encargo nombó el Sr. presidente á los Sres. Molinos, Sandoz y Dominguez. Se aprobó otra proposición del mismo Sr. Navarrete sobre que se vista á los huérfanos que acaso lleguen á Mejico antes del día 16 de setiembre.

El Sr. Basadre propuso y se aprobó, que la suscripción quedase abierta para todas las personas que quieran incluirse en ella. A propuesta de otro Señor se acordó que la comisión encargada de ejecutar el acuerdo escire á las demas juntas patrióticas de la república por medio de los sres. gobernadores de los estados, para que apliquen al mismo objeto una parte de sus fondos. Queda, pues, abierta la suscripción en la casa del Sr. Molinos, que está en la calle del Espíritu Santo núm. 6, y esperamos que nuestros con Ciudadanos de dentro y fuera de esta capital contribuirán para que tehgin su mas cumulo efecto las miras tan patrióticas como caritativas de la junta, cuya conducta es digna de todo elogio, no solo por lo que se hace honor á los mejicanos, sino por que hicimos, dotados por la provi dencia de una especial sensibilidad y generosidad, y porque tales rasgos fomentan estos sentimientos y forman los vinculos mas dulces de los hombres y los unicos que pueden hacer amable la sociedad.
