The Delaware 74 guns, is now fitting out for service, at Norfolk. P. A. Thompson of Baltimore, is appointed Purser.

In the Supreme Court of the United States, on the 29th and 30th ult., the case of the steamboat Planters v. Howard & Varon, on an appeal from the District Court of this state, was brought forward. Mr. Justice Thompson delivered the opinion of said Court, affirming the decree of the court in all respects, except the item of \$275.

Mr. James Jay, representative to Congress, from the state of New York, died at Washington, on the 23d ult.

CONGRESSIONAL. In Senate, February 21. After some minor business, among which was the re-consideration of the rule relating to recess at three o'clock, evening day was given.

Mr. Clayton then moved an amendment, the effect of which is to make the valuation of goods, the standard for the assessment of duties, to be the value of the goods on the 30th September, 1842, instead of the foreign valuation.

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FOUR DAYS LATER FROM ENGLAND. Extracts from late English papers received per ship New-York, at New-York.

The Liverpool accounts of the 15th of January, state that upwards of 10,000 bales of Cotton were destroyed by fire. The President's proclamation is published in the London papers entire.

From the Hague, January 15th.—It was rumored that a Courier was despatched yesterday evening from the department of Foreign Affairs to London with the answer of the Government to the last protest of England, and France.

London.—The Courier announces that Parliament would proceed to business during the first week in February.

The renewal of the charter of the Bank of England is still an absorbing topic. The general opinion is that it will be renewed, limiting however the extent of the exclusive privilege of the bank to a much smaller extent, than that fixed by the present arrangements.

Several regiments of English Militia were ordered to Ireland, with some of the line, to suppress "Volunteer Associations." The condition of that country is stated to be in an agitated state, and murder, and robberies, occurred constantly.

In the London paper of the 14th ult. we find it stated, an insurance had broken out in Madrid, in favour of Don Carlos, between the royal troops and the volunteers.

Accounts from Brazil of the 5th January, mention that orders had been received there to fit out three ships of the line, with the utmost despatch, but nothing certain is known of their destination, but it was believed an expedition to Hayti was contemplated.

PORTUGAL. LONDON, JAN. 14.—An interruption of maritime communications with Oporto for nearly a month, we have at last received despatches from that city of a very recent date, in last letters of our correspondent extend to the 8th inst, and contain a description of a series of events from the middle of December to that time.

Section 1. And be it further enacted, &c. That the President and Directors of the Board of Public Works, shall hold two meetings annually in the city of New Orleans or such other place as may be designated by law; one on the first Monday of December and one on the first Monday of April of every year, and to continue each session until the business of the board is transacted—but that the President of the board may, at his own pleasure, or shall, at the request of any three Directors hereof, convene an extraordinary meeting of the board, for the transaction of any extraordinary business which may devolve on the corporation.

Section 2. And be it further enacted, &c. That the President and Directors of the Board of Public Works may, at their meetings enact, alter or amend, such rules as to them may seem proper, for the purpose of regulating their proceedings; that they may have power to adjourn the board for any period not exceeding eight months, or when occasion shall require it, to have an extra meeting at any other place, than that designated by law; and shall have power to make and establish such by-laws, rules and regulations, for the better ordering of the conduct and works of the Civil Engineer of the State, and that of their officers, agents and servants, as to them may seem expedient; and provided, the same be not inconsistent with the constitution and laws of this State or of the United States of America—and the President shall also have power, at any time during the recess of the legislature, to fill any vacancy which may occur in their own body, either from death, resignation, removal, inability, or any other cause.

Section 3. And be it further enacted, &c. That the fund for internal improvement, subject to the order of the President and Directors of the board, shall be deposited by the Treasurer of the State in some bank, paying interest on deposit, or that the board make such investments as may be deemed more advantageous, not incompatible with the object of the fund, and that he keep distinct and apart, his accounts of said fund, from all other public money,—it shall be paid or delivered by the Treasurer of the State, to the order of the board, or during its recess, to the order of the ex-officio members thereof, certified and subscribed by the secretary and countersigned by the president; that the treasurer shall keep a full and regular account of all such disbursements, and preserve the certificates upon which the same shall have been made and shall render an account thereof to the legislature, at the same time at which he renders his annual account of the disbursement of the ordinary revenue; that once in every year the board of public works shall depute a committee of their own body to examine the accounts of all disbursements made during the year next preceding the meeting of the board, and to compare these accounts with the treasurer's books, and the certificates, giving authority for the payment of the several sums of money, or stock entered therein; that their report shall certify to the board, that the same have been fully accounted for, or otherwise, as the case may be.

Section 4. And be it further enacted, &c. That the President and Directors of the Board of Public Works, shall be and they are hereby authorized to subscribe in behalf of the State, to such public works, as the legislature may from time to time authorize, and in pursuance of the provisions of the law, for the purpose of directing by law; but that no part of said fund shall be subscribed towards the stock of any company, unless such company shall have been first approved by the legislature, and no such subscription shall be made until the same shall have been first approved by the legislature, and no such subscription shall be made until the same shall have been first approved by the legislature.
