St. Louis, March 24. The news from the 23d of March, Philadelphia of the 24th, and Baltimore of the same date. Ship Simpson, captain Chubbuck, from London at New York, supplies intelligence one day later, than that received by the Calcuttan.

The speech of the king, at the opening of parliament, which we give below, bears no impress of any thing very remarkable, with the exception of references made to Ireland. The ministry evidently affect to be invested with extraordinary powers, perhaps, for the purpose of enforcing a new law in that devoted country.

The text item of intelligence touches on a subject, to which the attention of the world will, for some time to come, be directed. Advice from Constantinople are of the 6th of January. The Sultan, from all accounts, in the extremity of danger, to which he has been reduced by the total defeat of his army, has accepted the proffered assistance of the Czar. General Muraviev has, therefore, set out for Egypt, with a view of bringing about the victory of Egypt's submission to the sublime gate.

The French papers speak of increasing activity in the arsenals at Brest and Toulon; from the tone of their language, it is not difficult to infer that a considerable squadron, the destination of which is as yet unknown, will shortly be ready for service. The armament at Toulon can have no other destination than the Levant. The intervention of the Russian power, in the affairs of Turkey, would seem to warrant the supposition.

At Home.—There is nothing new stirring in the home department. Every thing seems to have settled down to the quiet smoothness of prosperity. Among the least unimportant events, however, we perceive that our exchanges reproduce many rumors, touching intended changes, which it is believed, will shortly take place in the cabinet. That some of the higher officers, in the administration, may be excluded to others than the present incumbents, is nowise improbable. But the divergent accounts, which we have, would not entirely alter the physiognomy of the cabinet, and justify the supposition of a thorough change; though we believe that, such cannot be the present intention of the President.

On a thing, however, the different surmises evidently agree; they all concur in pointing to Mr. McLane as the head of the state department, and sending Mr. Livingston as minister to France, in spite of Mr. Harris' charges. The treasury department is generally assigned to Mr. Woodruff, who has distinguished himself in the navy department, which it is supposed will devolve on Governor Forreth. Opinions, however, vary on this score; Mr. Forreth is, by some, to assume the secretaryship of the navy, and Mr. Dallas that of the navy department. Mr. Barry either retains his present station, or goes to England or Spain; Mr. speaker Stevenson is spoken of as a missionary to the former power; either of these latter destinations devolve on Mr. Barry. The building bureau is assigned to Mr. Johnson, Col. R. Johnson—where we glean not from the navy on duty.

The ship Martha, which arrived at New-York, March 15th, fell in with the wreck of a vessel that had been burnt at 14 dead bodies floating around it. Picked up some spears, truss-ropes of the mizen mast, on which was written M. A. Taylor, mate of the ship, (the rest obliterated).
