The No. 10 Mail of yesterday and to-day have arrived bringing the regular dates. No arrivals furnishing later intelligence than we are already in possession of, from France or England, are mentioned.

An arrival at Boston from St. Ubes affords some intelligence from Lisbon of a day later than previously received.

LATER FROM PORTUGAL.

The Boston papers inform us of the arrival of the brig Carrier, Capt Power, from St. Ubes, which port she left on the 20th of September. As St. Ubes is only 12 or 15 miles from Lisbon, the intelligence from the latter port is probably as late as the 18th or 19th; being 10 days later than our previous accounts. It is stated, on the authority of Capt Power, that there had been no attack upon Lisbon since the 5th. This augurs favorably to the cause of Don Pedro. It would give him time to complete his defenses and prepare for a second encounter.

A few days before Capt. P. sailed, a steam boat from England with about twenty French officers, arms, ammunition, etc, for Don Miguel's army, was captured off the Tagus by one of Don Pedro's cruisers and carried into Lisbon.

COMMERCIAL.

New York, Oct. 25. THE MARKET.—But little is doing in Cotton, price a cent lower than before the late news. A large manufactory bought this morning 150 bales good Georgia at 15 1/2 c. The rest is no demand except from manufacturers and they buy as little as possible.

Oct. 26.—The sales this week have been on a limited scale—they have not exceeded 900 bales. Spinners have been the chief buyers and they have taken new Upends mostly at 16 to 17 cts on time; 30 had a fine new crop New Orleans brought 19 cts. By the jacket N. A. cotton we have received a notice from Liverpool to this date—the market was extremely depressed, the sales of the week preceding amounted only to 4400 bales; a reduction in price of 10 to 20 cts. per lb.—Receipts from Havre show that it is to be in a state of stagnation, even at a considerable decline in rates. The decline here is equal to 10 cent, without buyers, and we quote accordingly. The import of the week has been 2682 bales.

Tosacco—A sale of 49 bales Kentucky was made at 7 1/2 cts which is an advance of 1 cent. By auction 15 hhd Kentucky average 66 cts; 22 hhd 67 cts and 15 hhd average 37 1/2 cts per 100 lbs.

From Levy's Price Current, of today. Remarks.—It is rained at last; and the desire of our people for a respite is great. The market has been depressed and activity—strangers are arriving every day and a south great commerce is being opened to them. That every thing we are an appearance favorable to business is the general remark; and we do not but the present season will far exceed, in commerce, a port such as this, which has preceded it. The market is low water mark. The weather is wet and the market is low water mark.

Since the receipt of the last advices from Liverpool, we have had a serious decline in both markets, there has been very little done, and little has yet made public; indeed, such is the state of things, at this moment, that we have thought it best (and it accords perfectly with the views of buyers and sellers) to dispense with all quotation whatever. At what rate the market will again open, we cannot pretend to say; but it is generally conceded that operations to a fair extent would be made, ranging from 12 to 16 cents per lb.—averaging for fair lots, from 14 to 15 cents. Fine Cottons being scarce, it is supposed that they will bring higher prices. From what we have remarked, we venture to say, as our own impression, that holders are willing to recede in their pretensions, and are only waiting for offers to recommence operations, as any disposition to the contrary would not avail them. Arrived since the 1st instant of Louisiana and Mississippi 14,732 bales; Lakes, (from 1st October), 839; Florida, 1,432; together, 15,774 bales. Cleared in the same time: for Liverpool, 3648; Havre, 1130; New York, 1237; Boston, 459; together, 6374 bales; making an addition to stock of 9360, and leaving on hand, inclusive of all on ship-board not cleared on the 7th instant, a stock of 47761 bales.

Since making the above remarks, we have learned of a sale of 1800 bales, selections from good marks, at 15 cents per lb. This fact will enable our distant friends to draw better conclusions than any circumstance to which we could call their attention.

Tosacco—We have not heard a word on this subject, there being none on hand. Cleared this week, for New York 18 hds. Arrived, 44 hds.

SUGAR.—Sales to a small amount have been made on plantation, at 7 1/2 cents per lb; in the city, we quote ordinary fair, at 7 1/2 cents—small sales, and market unsettled. Cleared this week: for Charleston, 143 hds. 112 lbs; New York, 36 hds; together, 179 hds. 112 lbs.

Molasses—We heard of a sale made last week at 91 cents per gallon, distant from the city about two miles above, in the city, the process quote 25 a 26 cents per gallon. Small sales, and market unsettled. Cleared this week: for New York, 17 hds 22 lbs; Charleston, 6 hds 12 lbs; together, 23 hds 37 lbs.

Flour.—There is very little doing. During the week some sales were sold under the rates last quoted, but at this moment the business doing is at last week's quotation which we leave without change, viz: 84 50 a 84 62 1/2 per bbl. Arrived this week, 5183 bbls.

Wine.—Still lingers on hand, and, we think, retarded a shade this week; it is very dull at 31 a 32 cents per gallon. Arrived this week, 514 bbls.

Bacon, Beef, and Pork is coming in on a small scale. The demand is good, and prices steady for all. Arrived this week, 34 casks Bacon, 258 lbs; Beef, 87 Pork.

Lead.—Continues to be very dull, at 10 a 10 1/2 cts per lb. Arrived this week, 1307 kegs.

Lead, Pig, is in brick demand, at former rate, 85 12 1/2 cts per 100 lbs. Arrived this week, 7786 pigs.

Rope.—There is no unusual demand in this city; but the articles are sold to much wanted beyond the Lake Pontchartrain, and in Florida. Arrived this week: 299 pieces Bagging, 542 coils Rope.

CORK is selling by the cargo, at 87 1/2 cents per bbl, and at retail, No arrival this week.

HAT is extremely dull; the last sales by the cargo were at 62 1/2 cents per 100 lbs.

Coffee.—Sales of about 1100 bags common Havana have been made at 13 1/2 cents per lb. The market is dull, and Western buyers complain of the high rates asked for Havana Green.

SPERM CANDLES find fair demand at 37 a 38 cents per lb.

CHEESE is dull at 9 a 10 cents per lb.

LOW Tin.—There is no change in our quotations, 22 25 by the cargo, and 2 50 per cask; small sales.
