It is to be three stories high, fronting each street and will contain offices for insurance companies, brokers, &c. &c. The Exchange Room will cover an era of 82 feet wide by 57 feet deep, it is to be surmounted by a dome 75 feet high, at the centre of which a very large and aplendid light is to be suspended. The fronts of the building are to be of white marble, a contract for which has been effected with Messrs. James Kain & Stroud, and Newton Richards. who have shown the liveliest interest to meet the views of the spirited individuals who have embarked in this worthy undertaking.

The contract for building fixes the 1st day of August, ander a very heavy penulty, for the execution of the whole work, and it is confidently anticipated that on or about the 1st day of October, the edifice will be prepared to receive visitors. We cannot but again felicitate our fellow-citizens upon the prosecution of this and similar undertakings designed for their case and convenience, and which have for object a permanent good.
