Mr. Ewing the active governor of Illinois in his annual message to the Legislature, represents that State as rapidly advancing to an equality with the other States. The first measure to which he calls the attention of the legislature, is a revision of the criminal code, the present one being too sanguinary. Penalties, he says, should be proportioned to the respective crimes they were enacted to repress, since when too severe, the moral feelings of the community, and of the offender, are injured.

The financial situation of Illinois is described as "liberalizing under a changing parity." The expenses of the recent legislative department of the government have been \$700,000 of the judicial \$118,000, and of the legislative \$210,000, besides large sums for various purposes.

In regard to the United States Bank, Mr. Ewing speaks in the most decided manner. He charges that institution with all the distress which prevailed during last session throughout the country, and designates it as a dangerous and corruptive monopoly. He recommends the formation of a State Bank as a succedaneum of a national Bank.

The improvement of various parts of the State, by the construction of canals and rail-roads, and by rendering rivers navigable, is strongly urged. The union of Lake Michigan with the western waters may be effected, it is believed, by a rail way, and is recommended by Mr. Ewing as the best adapted to answer the purpose.

The Decree of Ethelred Green, by Mr. Knowles, has been brought out at the Park theatre in New York. The Times says it went off extremely well, though there was not a full house. It is a tale of romance and love, with strange incidents and unexpected situations and changes. The story is told in a simple and direct manner, and the characters are well drawn. The plot is interesting, and the dialogue is well written.
