CORRESPONDENCE OF THE BEE.

WASHINGTON CITY, Jan. 13th, 1835. The Senate for the last two days have been engaged in the discussionsof the claims of American citizens, on the government, growing out of the spoliations cummitted on our com merce by the French, during what is commonly termed the quasi-war, prior to the year 1800. The question is one of valid arguments for and against the rights of the claiments. One must feel very loth to sit in judgment, after a period of forty years, on the solemn acts of the government, especial ly with such a man, as Washington then was, at its head. Still reluctant as I may be to hazard an opinion, I cannot but confess that it does appear that the measures of the government, on that particular head, did in some measure justify the acts of France, out of which the present contest-

Subsequent to the treaty of the year seventy eight, anothe treaty was ratified between this country and France, in the year '88, by which an alliance was contracted between the two nations. Whether this alliance was both offensive and defensive, in its object; or whether offensive only, seems to have been a subject of doubt in the mind of the then chief magistrate of the union. For in the memorable year '93, the the nation has been sported with; and the very natural French Government, whatever that might have been, called on ours for assistance, in accordance with the stipulations of that treaty. Washington propounded several questions to his cabinet, among which were the following :-- Whether the existing government was actually the government of France-whether the war in which France was then engaged was an offensive and defensive one-whether either of the two-or whether it was a just, mixed or equivocal one. On the other hand, Jefferson and Randolph maintained that the articles of alliance between the two countries were clear and unequivocal, and consequently binding on the American people, whatever the existing form of government might be.
