JOURNAL
OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Tuesday, Jan. 27, 1835.

The House met, agreeably to adjournment.
On motion of Mr. Penn, ordered, that the House do now proceed to the election of a door keeper, vice Eben, deceased.
The ballot box having been carried around, and every member present having deposited his vote.
On motion, ordered, that two tellers be appointed.

Messrs. Penn and Rousell were appointed by the speaker.

On opening the ballot box, it appeared, that out of 88 votes, Mr. G. B. Faucher had obtained the unanimous vote of the House, and duly elected door keeper of the House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana; and took the oath of office in that capacity.

Mr. Ogden presented a memorial signed by a great number of citizens of the parish of East Baton Rouge, praying for a compensation for Mr. Kean, for the considerations therein specified.
On motion, ordered, that the same be referred to the committee on claims.

A message was received from the Senate, by Mr. Davis, their secretary, informing the House of the concurrence of the Senate in the joint resolution giving further instructions to the several committees appointed to examine into the affairs of the various banks in this city.

Mr. Penn offered a resolution appointing a joint committee of both Houses to wait on the Governor elect of this state, and inform him that the Legislature will be ready to receive him in the hall of representatives, on Monday, the 2d of February, proximo, for the purpose of proceeding to his installation, and administering him the oath of office; which resolution was read for the first time; and on motion, the House having dispensed with their rules, said resolution was taken up.

On motion, ordered, that the same be adopted.
The speaker appointed Messrs. Patin, Penn and Montegut members of said committee on behalf of the House.

The clerk was directed to inform the Senate thereof, and request their concurrence in said resolution.

Mr. Antonio Ducros offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the clerk of the House be authorized to employ an additional enrolling clerk.

On motion, ordered, that the same be adopted.

Mr. Lewis, on behalf of the judiciary committee, begs leave to be discharged of any further consideration of his prayer.

The same member, on behalf of the same committee, to whom was referred the bills entitled 'an act to provide for the appointment of justices of the peace and constables, and to explain their powers and duties,' and for other purposes, and 'an act relative to the administration of vacant estates,' moved that said bills be printed, and recommitted to be acted upon.

Mr. Winn, on behalf of the committee on propositions and grievances, to whom was referred the petition of Josiah Lawson and Joel K. Mead, made the following report:

The committee on propositions and grievances, to whom has been referred the petition of Josiah Lawson and Joel K. Mead, have the honor to report:

That the declarations contained in said petition, and the matters of fact therein stated, together with the annexed documentary evidence, have been maturely examined.

The committee are of the opinion that the various acts heretofore passed by the legislature, authorizing lotteries, were in themselves highly impolitic, and destructive of good morals in an eminent degree, and the act of April, 1833, which put an end, they hope forever, to lotteries in this state, met with their warmest approbation.

The act above referred to, declares, that after a specified period, to wit: 1st January, 1834, no lottery tickets shall be sold, nor any lottery drawn, under heavy penalties. The petitioners say, this act operates upon them as an ex post facto law, and declare the same to be unconstitutional. They seem to desire the legislature, at least in effect, so to declare it. This your committee cannot be so bold as to recommend. We are acting in a legislative, not a judicial capacity, and we do not think that any legislature should declare an act of a previous session unconstitutional, unless some flagrant injustice has been done, or some fundamental principle trampled upon, and this should be unequivocally palpable.

The case under consideration is not of such a character in the opinion of your committee, and though the act referred to may possibly have fallen heavily upon the petitioners, we cannot recommend them for legislative relief.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. Winn, on behalf of the committee on propositions and grievances, to whom was referred the petition of Henry B. Favrot, reported by introducing a bill entitled 'an act granting a ferry privilege to Henry B. Favrot,' which bill was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.

The same member, on behalf of the same committee, to whom was referred the petition of Jean Maillet, reported by introducing a bill entitled 'an act to establish a ferry on the river Mississippi, at the Plaquemine cut off, and Duncan's point in the parishes of East and West Baton Rouge,' which was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Lewis, on behalf of the committee on propositions and grievances, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to provide for a change of venue in criminal cases,' which was read for the first time, and on motion, referred to the judiciary committee.

On motion, ordered, that the same be printed.

Mr. Sheldou, on behalf of the committee on claims, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to provide for the opening of the outlets of Lake Mouchere, known as Field's Lake, in the parish of Lafourche Interior, and for other purposes.'

On motion, ordered, that said bill be referred to the committee on inland improvements.

Mr. Penn, on behalf of the committee on inland improvements, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to amend an act, entitled an act to amend the 101st article of the civil code of the state of Louisiana, approved Feb. 3, 1826,' which was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow; and a bill entitled

'An act to incorporate the Methodist Episcopal Church in the town of Covington, parish of St. Tammany,' which bill was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Landry gave notice that he will shortly introduce a bill entitled 'an act to amend the 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th sections of an act entitled an act to alter the method of holding elections in the 2d judicial district, and for other purposes.'

The House having dispensed with their rules, Mr. Montegut introduced a bill entitled

'An act relative to certain publications,' which was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Montegut moved for the reconsideration of the bill entitled 'an act to amend the revenue laws of this state,' which was adopted on Friday last.

The speaker decided that said motion was not in order.

Mr. Augustin appealed upon that decision. Said motion having been seconded.

The question was put, 'shall the opinion of the chair be maintained?'

Mr. Davidson called for the yeas and nays, when it appeared that Messrs. Bickham, Brashear, Braux, Brezanle, Briggs, Bry, Davignon, Delachaise, Dixon, Dossou, Landry, Lavergne, Lelouch, Milligan, Ory, Patin, Penn, Sheldou, Sibley, Wilson and Winn had voted in the affirmative—22 yeas.

And that Messrs. Armand, Augustine, Cavillat, P. A. Ducros, Antonio Ducros, Freret, Labatut, Montegut, Nerant, Rousell, A. B. Thibodeaux and H. C. Thibodeaux had voted in the negative—12 nays.

The opinion of the chair was consequently maintained.

The House having dispensed with their rules, took up the bill entitled 'an act to authorize the governor to furnish the Jackson guards with arms.'

On motion, ordered, that said bill be taken section by section.

The several sections having been adopted with amendments, On motion, ordered, that the said bill do pass by the following title:

'An act to authorize the governor to furnish the Jackson Guards and Democratic Guards with arms.'

The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said bill.

On motion, the House having dispensed with their rules, the bill entitled 'an act to revive the 1st and 2d sections of an act entitled an act to amend the act entitled an act to organize the supreme court of the state of Louisiana, and establish courts of inferior jurisdiction, approved March 22, 1826, and for other purposes,' which had been laid on the table, subject to the call of the House, was taken up.

On motion, ordered, that the same be taken section by section.

The several sections having been adopted, On motion, ordered, that said bill do pass and retain its title.

The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said bill.

The House took up the bill entitled 'an act to authorize the purchase and distribution of a certain number of copies of Benjamin & Sildoll's Digest of the Decisions of the Superior Court of the state of Louisiana.'

On motion, the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole, for the consideration of said bill.

Mr. Rousell, being called to the chair, After some time, on motion, the committee rose. The chairman, Mr. Rousell, reported that the committee had had said bill under consideration and had adopted the first section thereof, with amendments.

The House then took up said bill.
On motion, ordered, that the same be taken section by section.

The several sections having been adopted, On motion, ordered, that said bill do pass and retain its title.

The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said bill.

The House then took up the bill entitled 'an act establishing the eastern boundary line of the parish of Calahoula.'

On motion, ordered, that the same be laid on the table, subject to the call of the House.

Mr. Dossou presented a petition signed by several citizens of the parish of Calahoula, relative to the boundary line of said parish. On motion, ordered, that the same be laid on the table until the House shall take up the bill to establish the Western boundary of said parish.

Mr. Delachaise laid before the House an account of the publishers of the Lafayette Gazette, for papers furnished to the Legislature for the session of 1834. On motion, ordered, that the same be referred to the committee on claims.

Mr. Haile, chairman of the committee on elections, reported as duly elected, Abner N. Ogden, Esq. from the parish of East Baton Rouge.

On motion, ordered, that said report be adopted.

Mr. Sibley, agreeably to previous notice, introduced a bill entitled 'an act supplementary to the several acts proscribing the formalities to be observed in order to obtain the right to practice physic, or the profession of an apothecary in this state, and for other purposes,' which was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Cavillat, agreeably to previous notice, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to incorporate the Catholic Church of St. Paul, in the parish of Avoyelles,' which was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Brashear gave notice that he will shortly introduce a bill entitled 'an act to exempt from military duty all persons not liable to pay taxes.'

Mr. Armand gave notice that he will shortly introduce a bill entitled 'an act authorizing the payment of a certain sum of money to the widow of J. B. Chastant of the parish of St. James.'

Mr. Ogden gave notice that he will shortly introduce a bill entitled 'an act to amend certain articles of the civil code of Louisiana.'

Mr. Davidson gave notice that he will shortly introduce a bill entitled 'an act granting certain powers to the brigadier generals of the Militia in the state of Louisiana.'

Mr. Landry, agreeably to previous notice, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to repeal the 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th sections of an act entitled an act to alter the method of holding elections in the 2d judicial district, and for other purposes,' which was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Lawson gave notice that he would shortly introduce a bill entitled 'an act to amend the act entitled an act to amend the act to incorporate the Clinton and Port Hudson rail road company, approved 10th March, 1833.'

Mr. Haile, agreeably to previous notice, introduced a bill entitled 'an act relative to district attorneys, and for other purposes,' which was read for the first time, and ordered for a second reading on to-morrow.

Mr. Antonio Ducros, on behalf of the committee of enrollment, reported as duly enrolled, the resolution requesting the governor to deliver to Charles Gayarre Esq. his credentials, as a senator of the state of Louisiana, in the senate of the United States.

On motion, ordered, that said report be adopted.

The speaker having signed said resolution, the clerk was directed to request the signature of the President of the Senate thereto.

On motion of Mr. Dossou, the House took up the bill entitled 'an act establishing the western boundary of the parish of Calahoula.' The same having been amended both in the body and title.

On motion, ordered, that said bill do pass and be entitled 'an act establishing the western boundary of the parish of Calahoula, and for other purposes.'

The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in said bill.

A message from the governor, by Mr. Witz, his private secretary, transmitting to the House the annual report of the administrators of the charity hospital, which was read and referred to the committee to be appointed to visit said hospital.

On motion of Mr. Augustin, the House having dispensed with their rules, took up the bill from the Senate entitled 'an act to amend the act to incorporate the New Orleans and Carrollton rail road company.'

On motion, ordered, that said bill do pass and retain its title.

The clerk was directed to inform the Senate thereof.

On motion of Mr. Winn, the House took up the bill from the Senate, entitled 'an act to repeal the act appointing weighers of cotton, approved March 24, 1827,' during the discussion of which, the House proceeded to the

'An act to create additional election precincts in the parish of Natchitoches,' which were read for the first time, and ordered for a third reading on to-morrow.

The resolution appointing a joint committee to visit the charity hospital was read for the second time, and adopted. The speaker appointed Messrs. Brashear, Dixon, H. C. Thibodeaux, P. A. Ducros and Ory members of said committee on part of the House.

The clerk was directed to request the concurrence of the Senate in the same.

'An act to incorporate the Methodist Episcopal Church in the town of Covington, parish of St. Tammany.'

'An act relative to certain publications,' were read for the second time, and ordered for a third reading on to-morrow.

A message from the Senate, by Mr. Davis, their secretary, informing the House that the Senate had concurred in the resolution appointing a joint committee in relation to the installation of the Hon. E. D. White, governor elect of the state of Louisiana, on Monday next, the 2d proximo, at 12 o'clock, and that Messrs. Thomas and Dupre were appointed members of said committee on the part of the Senate.

By the same message, the House was informed that the committee of enrollment, on the part of the Senate, had reported as duly enrolled, the resolution requesting the governor to deliver to Charles Gayarre, Esq. his credentials, as a senator of the

state of Louisiana, in the Senate of the United States; and that the President of the Senate had signed the same.

Mr. Antonio Ducros, on behalf of the committee of enrollment, reported as duly enrolled the resolution requesting our senators and representatives in Congress to procure an appropriation of money, for improving the navigation, and removing the obstructions in Red River, below the raft, and especially, the rapids, or falls, in the neighborhood of Alexandria, and the resolution requesting our senators and representatives in Congress to obtain the passage of a law granting an appropriation for the building of a light house at the eastern end, or entrance of the pass Manchac; and an act to incorporate the subscribers to an association for the purpose of building an exchange in the city of New Orleans; and an act to incorporate the subscribers to an association for the purpose of building a hotel in the city of New Orleans.

On motion, ordered, that said reports be adopted.

The speaker having signed said resolutions and bills, the clerk was directed to request the signature of the President of the Senate to the same.

The House took up the bill entitled 'an act to incorporate the Atchafalaya rail road and banking company.'

On motion, ordered, that the said bill be taken section by section.

Mr. Lewis moved to amend the 8th section by inserting the word 'five,' instead of 'seven,' as the time fixed for the completion of said rail road.

On the question for the adoption of said amendment, the yeas and nays were called for by Mr. Lavergne, when it appeared that Messrs. Armand, Bickham, Broezeule, Conville, Daniel, Delachaise, Dixon, Lewis, M'Alister, Milligan, and Norant had voted in the affirmative—11 yeas; and that Messrs. Augustin, Brashear, Braux, Bry, Dossou, P. A. Ducros, Haile, Labatut, Landry, Lavergne, Lawson, Ogden, Ory, Sheldou, A. B. Thibodeaux, H. C. Thibodeaux, Wilson and Winn had voted in the negative—18 nays.

Said amendment was consequently rejected.

During the further discussion of said bill, On motion of Mr. Sparks, the House adjourned until to-morrow at 10 o'clock A. M.

JOURNAL OF THE SENATE.

Tuesday, Jan. 27, 1835.

The Senate met, agreeably to adjournment. Members present, Messrs. Charles Dorbigny, President, Bossier, Brownson, Dupre, Ho, Labauve Labranche, Lacoste, Maddox, Moore, Nicholas, Porche, Reid, Saunders, Tenney, Teto and Thomas.

Mr. Labauve, on part of the committee to whom was referred the petition of Joseph Thompson, reported and introduced a bill entitled 'an act authorizing Joseph Thompson to dispose by last will of all his property in favor of Joseph and Louisiana Thompson.' Read for the first time.

Mr. Moore moved for the rejection of this bill, and called for the yeas and nays, which resulted as follows:

Yeas—Messrs. Bossier, Ho, Labranche, Maddox, Moore, Teto and Thomas—7.
Nays—Messrs. Brownson, Labauve, Lacoste, Nicholas, Porche, Reid and Saunders—7. Rejected.

There being an equality of votes, the President voted in the affirmative, and the bill was rejected.

Mr. Thomas presented a petition, which was read, from a number of persons, praying for the repeal of the law of 1827, relative to the steam boat landing.

Mr. Thomas, at the same time, the rules being dispensed with, introduced a bill entitled 'an act to amend the second section of an act entitled an act to amend the several acts to incorporate the city of New Orleans, and for other purposes.'

Read for the first time.

Mr. Maddox gave notice that he would on to-morrow introduce a bill entitled an act to apportion the land tax between the parishes of Ouachita and Carroll.

Mr. Labranche, chairman of the committee on elections, reported the following Senators as duly elected:

Mr. Nicholas moved, that before proceeding to the order of the day, the resolution relative to the duties of the joint committees on the several banks be read for the second time. Carried. The rules were dispensed with, the resolution adopted and taken to the House.

On motion of Mr. Ho, the resolution relative to a stenographer for the Senate, which had been laid on the table, subject to call, was taken up and passed.

A message from the House, by Mr. A. Pitot, their clerk, requested the concurrence of the Senate in the bills and resolutions entitled:

'An act to continue in force the act incorporating the Roman Catholic Church of St. Bernard.'

'An act to incorporate the Ocean Insurance Company.'

'Resolution appointing a committee to call on the Hon. E. D. White.'

'An act to amend the revenue laws of the state.'

SPECIAL ORDER.

'An act relative to the Red River Rail Road and Banking Company.'

Second reading resumed. Mr. Tenney moved to amend the 14th section so as to impose a tax of 1-4 per centum on the capital stock of the said company.

Upon which Mr. Thomas called for the yeas and nays, which resulted as follows:

Against it, Messrs. Bossier, Brownson, Dupre, Ho, Labauve, Labranche, Lacoste, Maddox, Nicholas, Moore, Porche, Reid, Saunders, Teto and Thomas—14.

The amendment was rejected.

After some amendments, On motion, the reading of the bill was suspended at 19th section.

And the Senate met with closed doors on executive business.

On motion, the Senate adjourned until to-morrow at ten o'clock A. M.

Another lot adjoining the above, measuring 35 feet fronting on Bourbon street, by 120 feet 7 inches in depth, French measure, together with all the buildings thereon, consisting of a house made of bricks between posts, containing 2 apartments and a gallery, the kitchen extends about a foot on the adjoining lot.</
