Office of Commissary General of Subsistence, Washington, July 11th, 1834. SEPARATE PROPOSALS will be received at this office, until the 1st day of October next, for the delivery of provisions for the use of the troops of the United States, to be delivered in bulk, upon inspection, as follows:

wise designated, will consist of one hog to each barrel, including the feet, legs, ears, and snout. Side pieces may be substituted for the hams. The pork to be carefully packed with Turke's Island salt, and in pieces not exceeding ten pounds weight each.

The provisions for Fort Armstrong, Prairie du Chien, and Saint Peters, must pass St. Louis, for their ultimate destination, by the 16th April, 1835. A failure in this particular, will be considered a breach of contract, and the Department will be authorized to purchase to supply these posts.

The provisions will be inspected at the time and place of delivery, and all expenses to be paid by contractors, until they are deposited at such store houses as may be designated by the agent of the Department.

The Commissary General reserves the privilege of increasing or diminishing the quantities, or of dispersing with one or more articles, at any time before entering into contracts, and also of increasing or reducing the quantities of each delivery one-third, subsequent to the contract, on giving sixty days' previous notice.

Bidders not heretofore contractors, are required to accompany their proposals with evidence of their ability, together with the names of their sureties, whose responsibility must be certified to by the District Attorney, or by some person well known to the Government; otherwise, their proposals will not be acted on.

Advances cannot be made in any case; and evidence of inspection and full delivery will be required at this office, before payment can be made, which will be by Treasury warrants on Banks nearest the points of delivery.

The Spanish language forms a separate charge. A quarter once entered on is considered as finished and must be paid in full. No deduction is made for absence, unless it be occasioned by sickness and continue for more than one month. Each boarder is to be furnished with a bedstead not more than 28 inches broad, if possible, with two mosquito bars, two mattresses, two blankets, one pillow or bolster, two pairs of sheets, two pillow-cases, one white cover case, 12 towels, a sufficient quantity of clothes and linen, one silver spoon, one steel fork and knife, and a pocket watch. Every article must be distinctly marked with the pupil's name.

Shirts and towels are retained for the use of the infirmary, when the pupils leave. Day-boarders are entitled to all their meals—they must also bring six table spoons, one fork, and knife, and a pocket watch. Two sisters or two brothers may be allowed to stay together.
