SEPARATE PROPOSALS will be received at
this office, until the 1st day of October next, for the
delivery of provisions for the use of the troops of the United
States, to be delivered in bulk, upon inspection, as
follows:

At New-Orleans.

NOTE.

All bidders are requested to extend the amount of their bids for each article, and exhibit the total amount of each bid. The periods and quantities of each delivery at the ports where they are not specified, will be one-fourth Jun., 1st September, 1st December, 1834, and 1st March, 1835.

The hogs of which the pork is packed, to be fastened on corn, and each hog to weigh not less than two hundred pounds; and, except when the quality is other-

wise designated, will consist of one hog to each barrel, excluding the feet, legs, ears, and snout. Side pieces may be substituted for the hams.

The pork to be carefully packed with Turks' Island salt, and in pieces not exceeding ten pounds weight each. The pork to be contained in seasoned heart of white oak or white ash barrels, fasthooped. The vinegar in iron-bound casks; the beans in air-light barrels; and the soap and candles, of convenient size for transportation.

Salt will only be received by measurement of thirty-two quarts to the bushel. The candles to have cotton wicks.

The provisions for Fort Armstrong, Prairies du Chien, and Saint Peters, must pass St. Louis, for their ultimate destination, by the 15th April, 1835. A failure in this particular, will be considered a breach of contract, and the Department will be authorized to purchase these posts. The provisions will be inspected at the time and place of delivery, and all expenses to be paid by contractors, until they are deposited at such store houses as may be designated by the agent of the Department.

The Commissary General reserves the privilege of increasing or diminishing the quantities, or of dispersing with one or more articles, at any time before entering into contracts, and also of increasing or reducing the quantities of each delivery one-third, subsequent to the contract, by giving sixty days previous notice. Bidders, not heretofore contractors, are required to accompany their proposals with evidence of their ability, together with the names of their sureties, whose responsibility must be certified to by the District Attorney, or by some person well known to the Government; otherwise, their proposals will not be acted on. Advances cannot be made in any case; and evidence of inspection and full delivery will be required at this office, before payment can be made, which will be by Treasury warrants on Banks nearest the points of delivery, or near the places of purchasing the supplies, or at the residence of the contractor, at their option.

It is proposed to have a separate envelope, and marked "Proposals for furnishing Army subsistence."
