

The northern mail of to-day was duly received. We notice nothing of much importance.

A GREAT MAN HAS FALLEN IN ISRAEL. It is our melancholy duty to announce the death of the Hon. WM. H. CRAWFORD. He expired on the morning of the 15th inst. within eight miles of Elberton, Georgia.

BOARD OF HEALTH. The Board report that there have been 13 deaths in the city generally, 4 in the City Hospital, 2 in the Orleans Hospital, 2 in the Belleuve Hospital, 1 in the Charity Hospital, and 1 in the St. Martin's Hospital.

BUFFALO BOARD OF HEALTH. The Board of Health report, since yesterday, 12 o'clock, 3 deaths by Cholera.

GLOBAL-EXTRA. WASHINGTON CITY, September 13. GLORIOUS NEWS FROM MAINE. The Star in the East, is still the Day Star of the Democracy of the Union.

The Democratic Governor is no doubt elected, from the indications in the Portland and York Districts, by an increased majority in the State. We small certainly have a gain in Congress of one member, in the person of Mr. Fletcher, from Vermont, and we may well hope for another in that of Mr. Van Ness.

I give you the result of this day's election in York county. There are 25 towns entitled to 21 Representatives, and 2 Senators—returns are received from 22 towns—Sebanian, Tuxton, and Hollis, not heard from, the two latter decidedly democratic, and the first about equally divided.

LATE FROM MEXICO. By the schooner Mary & Francis, from Vera Cruz, we have received our files up to the 15th inst. Peace and harmony continues at Vera Cruz. About \$2,500,000 has been lately exported from that city; of which sum \$2,000,000 have been shipped to England.

LATE FROM SPAIN. By the politeness of two commercial houses of this city, we were favoured with Havana papers, up to the 20th inst. inclusive. They contain news of great interest from Spain, brought thither by the Spanish brig El Vapor, in 33 days' passage from Cadix.

BAYONNE, Aug. 4. According to the official communications received at the Spanish Consulate, and the despatches received by Don Joachim Ferrer, procurador of the Cortes, and the staff officer Don Miguel de Arce, of the army of Gen. To Don Miguel de Arce. The captain general of Valencia, under date of the 25th ult. addresses the Secretary of War as follows.—The Brigadier Don Jose Santa Cruz, commanding the East from the Mountains to the country between Lorca and Pohlen informs me of the following particulars: "Having learned from spies that Cabrera had left the plains and mountain of Torroja, I had no doubt that he would join Morilla's party below Aragon, with the view of surprising some small detachment as he had already done, in consequence I made two forced marches from Ceula, and reached him in the neighborhood of Zozita, whose detachment he was going to attack.

The Carabiniers who until then had been kept in reserve, began to act on the right of the mountain, but the columns withdrew rapidly by the other side, directing their march through the pine forests on the mountains of Bayceles; leaving on the battle field 50 dead, as results from this report made by the lieutenant Don Bartolomeo Rosella. My loss, though but small, as the dead amount only to 3 Cazadores of the 1st Regiment of the line, a Sergeant of the 13th and a soldier of Morilla's company, and six wounded, is much to be lamented in account of the death of Captain Serrano.

The troops of Aragon who defended the points of Monigo, Ponzoya, &c., joined together in hearing the fire in the mountains, which lasted from 5 o'clock to half past eleven A. M., commanded by the officers of the 13th of the line, Don Vicente Leraoche, and Don Bernardo Desis; but when they arrived on the field of action, the enemy had disappeared.

COMMERCIAL.

From Levy's Price Current. New-Orleans, Sept. 27. REMARKS. The weather is favorable to our dear affairs, and the Mississippi, as last noted, is 12 feet below high water mark. Generally, business remains without sensible improvement, and transactions on a limited scale.

COTTON—Arrived since the 15th inst. of Louisiana and Mississippi, 3122 bales (3115 of which is of the new crop); Tennessee and North Alabama, 48—total, 3170 bales. Cleared in the same time for Bremen, 407 bales; New-York, 1423—together, 1835—making an addition to stock of 1335, and leaving on hand, inclusive of all on ship-board not cleared on the 25th instant, a stock of 6,300 bales. The demand is probably as good as it could be when the season and the stock are taken into consideration. The sales of the week are estimated at 2500 a 3900 bales, of from 15 a 15 1/2 cents round. Among the sales, we notice particularly the following, viz: 41 a 14 7/8, 105 a 15 1/4, 330 a 15 1/4, 63 a 15 1/4, 104 a 15 1/4, 237 a 15, 20 a 15 1/4, and 105 a 15 1/4, of the new crop of Louisiana and Mississippi; and 105 a 13 7/8, 104 a 15, 71 a 12 1/2, and 22 a 11 cents per lb. of the old. We give it as the opinion of several merchants, with whom we have conversed, that owners would do well to hold their cotton in as early a sale as possible, in order to avoid the chances of present prices, and before time is given for the stock to accumulate.
