SKETCHES OF THE SENATE-NO ROBERT CARTER NICHOLAS. Mr Nicholassis sonstor from the district of Ascenlames, sometimes termed Acadia. He has been one of the

most useful members of the senate, considered in a busines wint of view. He is intimate with the routine of legisla tive duties; and conversant with almost every species of sub ject presented for legislation. He is one of those who 'read mark, learn and inwardly digest' for themselves; and he appears able at all times to draw on his intellectual resources. He does not indeed often protrude himself on public notice nor occupy snuch of the time of the sonate; but whatever h does is generally performed safely if slowly. Festing lente. may be his guide in deliberation; yet his energies often dictate whose thoughts appear more consecutive and concatenated; as a speaker his style is cogent and precise, and his manner chaste and unembarrest; and as a senator, he is attentive to the interests not only of his own more immediate constituents

but to theireneral welfare. He has but occasionally spoken in the senate: and the only on topics wherein he rather actually than apparently acted the part of arbiter or unipire. Even at the early par of the session, this was evidenced in his support of a particular clause of the bill to drain the swamp-no opposition being made to the formerly objectionable feature, when he had ex. plained its object, and elucidated its effects. Again a bill had been proposed to amend various articles of the code of pracatice.
