JACKSON SQUARE. By reference to the reports of the city council's proceedings in yesterday's papers it will be seen that it resolved to restore the use of the ground now called Jackson square, to the general government for the purpose of building a branch of the U. S. mint. It will be remembered that rather than let that ground lie waste or unimproved, Congress permitted the corporation to use it as a public square. Congress still retained possession of the property however, and the right of revoking the use when proper or convenient.

Whether to apply to Congress for this revocation of the use of the authorities of the federal government have intermediately applied to the council for its revocation. The corporation never had more than permission to use the ground as a public square, and only to use it for that purpose; never therefore obtained possession of that property in remission required for its use. The council has fortunately agreed to the revocation required for its use, and the corporation would then have no power whatever over the ground, municipal or otherwise. And if Congress were obliged to refer to this alternative the litigation points now at issue between the city and the general government might not so amicably be determined.

This question is a purely simple. No property vested or acquired is proposed to be alienated; merely the right of controlling the U. S. property as a public square is to be resumed. Yet the proposal is singularly affected in an afternoon paper, by one who appears more ignorant of its incense as if it originated from sectional feelings, and as if the measure had been dishonorably passed by the city council, in the absence of two of its members.

When the resolution was introduced, two members had been retired from the meeting; and 6 were present. As the resolution was not the subject of the other 21, the latter were indeed absent at the time of taking the vote. It would have been a great pity to see the question which was discussed on account of his request for information. Mr Baldwin was the only member who opposed the motion.

As regards ourselves, we are convinced of the propriety of resuming the use to the general government of its own property, for such a valuable purpose as building a mint.
