In France, the number of literary productions, which quadresled itself from 1814 to 1626, increased twofold from 1865 to 1628, At this period the number of works published in France was 7616; in 1830, 6739; in 1831, 6063, and in 1833, 7011. In England, the commercial value of literary works amounted, in 1838, to the sum of 244,4500, and in 1833, to 415,3000; and adding to this the smooth of daily and weekly papers, reviews, and magazines, the general sale of English literature in 1833 may be estimated at the large sum of 2,420, 3005, sterling. In all France, during the year 1831, only 24 persons were executed, of whom 24 had been convicted of murder.
