Already has its influence been felt in the eager purchases of real state in different parts of the city, particularly in the upper district, where property in many instances has risen 25 per cent; but this will overdo the matter.— Capitalists who can invest their funds in real estate Capitalists who can invest their funds in real estate below for 50 dollars will not be particularly anxious to purchase like property above for 150—as they could give equal or superior advantages to the port and commercial conveniences of the lower municipality. Unwise speculation will defeat itself

New Orleans will now be divided into three munici-pulities, whose inhabitants will have sufficient power patities, whose innabitants will have summer power and privileges to pursue their separate and joint interests in whatever manner may be deemed most advisable, according to their means and wasts. Hitherto the contests between the several wards have been struggles of strife and opposition—now they will be struggies of strie and opposition—now they will be those of rivalry and competition; and must therefore promote the true interests of all and each.

That we are sanguine in our expectations of the benefits likely to result from this separation, need not be

concealed; as we are awars of what may be effected in a proper spirit with adequate means, and of the en-ergy of a large portion of our citizens who can stimu-late the sluggish and inert to emulous efforts. The contest between the three municipalities must be in al-gording superior facilities for commerce and advanta-ges for residence to merchants and citizens: for such facilities and advantages are also described. concealed; as we are aware of what may be effected facilities and advantages can alone determine preferepce and promote prosperity.

One advantage almost certain to result will or should be lowering the rents of houses and stores; and indeed

diminishing the price to enhance the value of lots.
This judicious policy is not properly understood or appreciated by many of the landed proprietors—particularly of the lower parts of the city. Had some of the landowners of the suburbs Marigny, Washington and Franklin understood it, they might long since have had them densely populated; but they were like the dog in the manger—they could not use the lands themselves, and would not allow ethers. similar policy, and dispose reasonably of part of their lands or lots to capitalists, they will ensure its prosperity, and (as they may wish an appeal to their cupidity) they will enhance tenfold the value of the lots they may retain. By disposing of part of their property, they will 'throw a sprat to catch a salmon'—and 'by hook or crook they must induce merchants to reside there.— They must construct good wharves and markets—pave and light their streets—and induce residents.
