Of

convicts is becoming so profitable, that last year its value exceeded the current expenses by \$3,076-29; not that the state made that sum by their labor, but saved that the state made that sum by their score, our award it in the rection of additional wings and cells. When the building shall have been completed, and the convicts have their workshops prepared and in use, the profits actually arising from their labor will greatly exseed the cost of their maintenance.

Perceiving the profitable nature of the convict labor the committee avail themselves of the opportunity to recommend that confinement for terms of years proor crimes in this state; and consequently that capital eporter on the part of the enate, argues more justly nd honorably on this subject. Laws he believes hould not be enacted for the sake of revenge: nor adopted, or what legislator first conceived and digest-ed the plan—if the law itself be found to be unwise and gitimate purposes of all penal enactments—the first to deter criminals and guard society, the second to reclaim the offender and repair the injury which he may have done society. The prevention of crime can as easily be obtained by confinement, for life in a penitentiary, as by the loss of info itself; for the severity of punishment is found not to be a deterrent from crime, while it often indulges a laxity in the administration of justice. It is preferable to have mild laws well administrated, than write our statutes in blood; and make them

well in practice. The true policy of all penal enact-ments is clemency in the legistator, and inflexibility in the judge; not have vengeance recorded on our statute books, and then permit juries and judges to have com-passion on malefactors; or almost prevent the prosecuiou of criminals. The threat of vengeance is not so ef-

But on the second head, the substitution of penitentiary confinement for life has a manifest advantage over the infliction of capital sunishment: because not only is society rid of the criminal, but it is enabled to profit by his labor; and he has opportunities for being reclaimed.
