The is a claim instituted by the plaintiffs against the brig Eleanor, for compensation for samages alleged to have been done to a shipment of iron, by stowing it under a number of bags of salt, by reason of which it became rusty, and no a certain degree unmerciantable. The iron has been absended by the plaintiffs and sold at public aucritud by order of and under the inspection of the Port Warden, for account of whomsover it may concern. The nett proceeds of the sale are \$1686 47—the estimated value of the same iron free from rust is \$614 42, as appears by the certificate of two respectable importers and dealers in that article, who surveyed it—the difficience being \$727 98, is the amount claimed of the brig.

The esptain of the brig denies the plaintiff a claim, on the ground that a special contract between the shippers and himself relieved him from all responsibility respecting the stowage of the iron. He declares that when he was applied to by the shippers to carry it, he declined oning so on the ground of his having all ready engaged to take a large quantity of salt, sale, the impossibility of atle take a large quantity of salt, sale, the impossibility of atlending to the effect that he salt; that to this objection the shippers replied, he might stow it how and where he pleased, that he could not damage it do with it what he might—that the w-rest that could happen to it would be rust, which he were the bill of lading to the effect that he should not be made accountable for any damage arising from rust, which clause is actually singuised in the bill of lading exhibited to the committee by the plaintiffs. It is pleasing to find that Congress is disposed to make an appropriation for reclaiming the lands around Barrataria bay—at least we infer so from a letter of Barrataria bey—at least we infer so from a letter of Mr Henry Johnson to one of his constituents.
