GREAT CANAL FROM THE LAKES TO T HE ATLANTIC.

We observe that a grand project is agitated in the State of New York, for uniting the waters of the great western lakes with those of the Atlantic, by a ship and steamboat canal, adapted to ressels of large burder.

The plan is to improve the navigation of the Oswa 190 and Oneida rivers, and Oneida lake, and extend a despend of the canal from the latter to the valley of the Mohawk, at Utica; and from that point, to take the channel of that river, or construct a large canal along its valley, to the tide waters of the Hadson. From Owergo to Utica, abeat half the distance, the route I has been surveyed, and is wall to afford romark able facilities, being aiready a deep navigable channel to their of the way, and requiring but about \$1,200,000\$ to complete it to Utica.
