One letter states that there is not more than a month's provisions in that part of the country; and from the tateness of the season, there can be no expectation of the potatoe are on that least ten days several ship loads of potatoes whe been purchased by order of government, and sent to different ports along the const, to be distributed to the starving people, and tarther supplies are in prefation; but this relief can only be temporary. If extensive aid be not very promptly afforded, thousands must die of actual starvation.
