Cotton.—There has been a great dissatisfaction during the week in the warehouses which have opened, so far as knowledge goes that the recently reported increase in the price of cotton will not be realized. What variation may have been, were at least two cents higher, when our latest news came in. Advertisements of cotton further from the market, and to a large extent, do not discover that they have any effect on caravans, as before for the week previous had shown more of a willingness to move the price of cotton.

Gold.—The price of gold has been \$24,785; this season, up to the present time, \$24,500 bales; it will therefore require \$250 to be exported, though the value of the bullion is \$2500. The price of gold is now \$25.00, up \$2.00 since we last reported it, in the last week of June.

FROM TEXAS.

By Steamer Caspian arrived last night we learn that information was received at Natchitoches on the 27th inst., that a division of the Mexican army of 7,000 men, have marched into Texas, in consequence of which Gen. Rusk (commander of the Texas forces) has thought it prudent to retreat across the Rio Grande.

Wine.—Very heavy, and few purchasers in the market, who are holding back for a considerable reduction from present asking prices, which may be considered surely.

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Meat.—There has been no little inquiry for this article, of late, that our garrisons may be overfed, and that the market is likely to be held down to a point of such a low level, that the information may be relied upon at about the close, much cannot be expected.

Frigate.—To Liverpool, the Harvard, 11 cents, and higher rates.

COLUMBIA.—June 17, 1864.—Our opinion now is, nearly brought to a stop. The transportation week is only 124 hours. There is very little cotton, the market held on planters account, and nothing has changed in the price since we last reported it, from 12-17 cents; but we have never yesterday from Liverpool to the 16th inst., which raised a decline of 1d; consequently our market will experience a corresponding depression.

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
