Bennett, President of the Republic of Texas. by and with the advice and consent of the Cabinet, de order, decree, and proclaim the port of Matamoras, in the Tamaulipas, and Republic of Mexico; comprising the mouth of the Rio Grande and the Braxos Sentiago, and also the inlets, setuarres and passes east of it, that now and hereafter may be in in possession of Mexico, and from and after the date of this proclamation, in a state of sheelute blockade by the armed vessels of this nation.

And for the purpose of carrying this proclamation into complete effect, an armed naval force now is and will continue to be kept at or near the said port, inlet and passes, entirely sufficient to enforce this decree.
